At a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Fredericksburg, Virginia held pursuant to notice in the Council Chamber of said City on Thursday the 17th day of January 1901 at 7:30 o'clock PM There were present, Hon M G Willis, Mayor

Capt T McCracken, Recorder

Councilmen E D Cole, G W Wroten, W E Bradley, W S Embrey, C W Jones, M J Gately, M S Chancellor, S S Bradford and Lawrence Perry

The meeting was called to order and the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Col Cole, Chairman Finance Committee reported the following bills, Electoral Board \$18.00, Engineering Record \$8.00; Manufacturing Record \$3.00, E D Cole expenses &c \$5.31; Southern Stamp Stationary Co, \$33.00; Fredericksburg Star \$8.25; R A Kishpaugh \$1.50 aggregating seventy seven and 06/100 dollars, which on motion were ordered to be paid

Col Cole stated that pursuant to the resolution of the Council adopted on November 8th 1900, directing the Finance Committee to deliver the \$12000 of Electric Light bonds "to the parties making the loan and shall turn over the said \$12,000 to the Treasurer" said Committee had carried the said resolution into effect as evidenced by the receipt of the Treasurer, which is in words and figures as follows, viz;

Fredericksburg, Va January 1, 1901

Received from Col E D Cole, Chairman of Finance Committee

Twelve Thousand and thirty dollars, being proceeds from Electric Light Bonds sold by order Council (22 of \$500 each, 10 of \$100 each) amounting in all to \$12,000 premium thirty dollars.

Col Cole presented the bond of Wm Fitzpatrick Sept Gas Works in the penalty of \$2000, with T McCracken as surety therein which bond was read, accepted by the Council when the said bond shall have been properly stamped and the Mayor will deposit the same in the National Bank of Fredericksburg for safe keeping.

Col Cole presented the receipt of "A B Botts, Agt" of the Fidelity and Deposit Co of Maryland for \$10 being premium on bond #120829 to City of Fredericksburg of S J Quinn for one year from January 1, 1901 to January 1st 1902. Said receipt was accepted and the Mayor requested to attach same to the original bond and deposit it in the National Bank of Fredericksburg for safe keeping.

Col Cole then offered the following

Resolved by the Council; that the Mayor execute the deeds of Trust upon the Electric Light Plant for Lighting the City, embracing therein all rights of water-power [Page 381] connected therewith to secure the \$12,000.00 of Electric Light Bonds with interest thereon, and attach the seal of the Corporation to the same, and said deed of trust shall be attested by the Clerk of the Council, which was unanimously adopted And

Col Cole offered the following

Resolved by the Council that the Joint-Committee on Sewerage and Street Improvement and are hereby directed to obtain from the approaching extra session of the Legislature of Virginia the necessary legislation to carry out the recommendation of said Joint-Committee in their report, heretofore adopted in relation to the issue of \$38,000.00 of bonds of the City; and in relation to its assessment of property benefited by such improvements,

And also giving the City the power of condemnation for right-of-way for sewerage.

Mr Bradley, Chairman of Alms & Alms-House Committee stated that the Committee of Mrs Margaret V. King had paid to the Treasurer the sum of \$5.00 per month for the period from July 1st 1900 to January 1st 1901, pursuant to the request of the Council as of record December 20, 1900.

Mr Jones, Chairman Committee on Schools reported that at the request of said Committee the Finance Committee had paid the 1st and 2nd quarters payments to the Fredericksburg College and of motion of Capt McCracken the action of the School Committee and the said payments by the Finance Committee were both approved by the Council.

Mr Jones presented & had read the reports for the month of October 1900 of the Scholars attending said College under the arrangement of the Council with the College.

The Mayor reported fines collect & paid to Treasurer \$32.50 And dog licenses issued 5.50 less 15ϕ each to Treasurer 4.75 And that the Police had performed their duty.

Mr Embrey, Chairman Joint-Committee on Sewerage and Street improvement made a report and statement from Engineer Davis setting forth that 12 bids had been received for construction of sewers ranging in amounts from \$22,743.70 down to \$13,292.80 = \$14,492.80

And offered the following:

Resolved by the City Council that the bid of T C Hookway of Syracuse, NY for sewering the City in accordance with the plans and specifications of Engineer Davis be accepted by the Joint-Committee on sewerage and street improvement so soon as the legislation directed by resolution of the Council is obtained, provided said Joint Committee [Page 382] shall approve said bid and said contractor; and when said bid is accepted the said Committee shall execute contract with said contractor.

A recorded vote being called for on said resolution, was had as follows

For Messrs Cole, Wroten, Bradley, Embrey, McCracken, Jones, Gately, Chancellor, Bradford and Perry (10)

Against nobody, and the resolution was declared adopted unanimously.

Col Cole presented a communication of Mr M C Hall touching the efficiency of the gas light which was read.

Mr Embrey moved that the same be laid on the table, and a recorded vote being called for was had as follows

For Mr Embrey's motion to lay on the table Messrs Wroten, Embrey, McCracken and Gately (4) Against Messrs Cole, Bradley, Jones Chancellor, Bradford and Perry (6) and the motion was lost Whereupon

Mr Jones moved that Mr Hall's communication be turned over to the Light Committee which was carried And on motion of Mr Bradford the Council adjourned

Councilmen E D Cole, W E Bradley, W S Embrey, J P Rowe, C W Jones, M S Chancellor and S S Bradford.

The meeting was called to order and the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Mayor stated that Fidelity & Deposit Company of Maryland had lodged a new bond guaranteeing S J Quinn as Superintendent of the City Water Works, in lieu of the renewal receipt continuing said Company's old bond for 1900, which new bond the Mayor had placed in National Bank as directed.

Col Cole, Chairman Finance Committee; presented the following bills, to-wit: Star, \$4.50; Corbin \$5.48; Corbin, Clerk Court [Page 383] \$13.50 which on separate motion were ordered to be paid Col Cole also presented the old 6% Bridge Bonds of par value of \$25,000, which had been redeemed by

the new issue of 4% bonds of a like amount.

And the old 6% Gas Bonds of par value of \$25,000. Which had been in like manner redeemed by the new issue of 4% bonds of a like amount.

And asked that a Special Committee be named to examine and check off said \$50,000 of bonds together with the un-matured coupons attached to said bonds

Whereupon, the Mayor appointed the following committee Messrs W E Bradley, S S Bradford and C W Jones, who proceeded to examine said bonds and coupons thereto attached which examination resulted as follows, to wit:

Capt McCracken moved that the said Gas Bonds and Bridge Bonds aggregating the sum of \$50,000.00 together with the coupons attached to said bonds be burned by said Special Committee in the presence of the Council which was accordingly done.

And said Special Committee reported as follows:

The Committee to burn the \$25000.00 of old Bridge Bonds and \$25000.00 of old Gas Bonds with coupons attached report that the same were counted and found correct and burned as ordered in the presence of the Council

Col Cole then presented a bill of J A Taylor Cash'r of the National Bank of Fredericksburg, for his services in holding and handling the said Gas & Bridge Bonds when were being redeemed, amounting to \$10.00 which on motion was ordered to be paid.

Col Cole then offered the following;

Whereas the Council by resolution bearing date on the 29th day of March 1900 directed the Finance Committee to negotiated a loan of \$25000.00 to redeem the bonds known as Bridge Bonds and further resolved that said bonds when sold should be secured by a deed of trust on the said Bridge;

And whereas said bonds were duly issued and disposed of and the same have been secured by a deed of trust as authorized by said resolution and by the Act of the General Assembly of February 18, 1898, which said deed of trust secured all of said bonds alike without priority of right to satisfaction of one bond over another; the aforesaid deed of trust was executed by the Mayor and Clerk of the Council on the 6th day of July 1900;

Resolved that the said deed of trust is hereby ratified and confirmed.

Which on motion of Capt McCracken was adopted.

Col Cole then offered the following;

Whereas by recent Act of the General Assembly of Virginia passed at the extra session in January 1901, the City Council of Fredericksburg were authorized to issue and dispose of coupon or registered bonds not to exceed the par value of \$38,000.00, said bonds to conform to the requirements of Section I of the Act of February 1st 1896, except that said bond or any of them may be made payable and may be redeemable at the option of the City Council at such time as the Council may declare on the face of the Bonds;

Resolved that the Finance Committee of the Council do have the bonds provided for in said Act, not to exceed the par value of \$38,000.00 lithographed

Said bonds to bear date April 1, 1901, being payable (30) thirty years after the date of their issue and redeemable at the option of the City Council at any time after (10) ten years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed four per centum per annum, payable semi-annually;

Said bonds when lithographed to be signed and attested as required by said Act of February 1st, 1896 Which on his motion was adopted.

Whereupon

Mr Rowe offered the following;

Resolved by the Common Council of the City of Fredericksburg, that the Finance Committee of this Council be and they are hereby directed to advertise in the (3) three newspapers published in this City and in any other manner that said Committee may deem advisable for bids for the sale of \$18,000.00 of the issue of \$38,000.00 of four per cent bonds of the City of Fredericksburg authorized by the foregoing resolution adopted by the Council, and said Finance Committee shall as [Page 385] herein provided effect a sale of said bonds, and upon receipt of the price therefor shall deliver the same to the purchaser or purchasers and deposit the money received therefor in Bank to the credit of the City Treasurer; But the said Committee shall not accept any bid for any of said bonds which is below the par value thereof. Which resolution was adopted.

The Hon Alvin T Embrey, Commonwealth's Attorney for this City was on motion of Capt McCracken, invited to address the council which he did, and requested the Council to set aside a fund to be called the "Criminal Contingent Fund) and explained the purposes for which said fund should be used. He further stated that in the proper preparation of a criminal case the pending in our Corporation Court he had had occasion to seek expert evidence to be used in the discharge of his office, and that the laws of Virginia made not allowance for such expenses to be paid from the State Treasury, so that he personally had felt obliged to assume the payment of said expenses which were necessary under the circumstances.

Whereupon Col Cole moved that the sum of \$30.00 being the amount so expended by the Attorney for the Commonwealth be refunded to said officer.

Which motion was adopted

And Mr Bradford offered the following, to-wit;

On the request of the Attorney for the Commonwealth of this City and on his representation to the Council that said fund will promote the ends of public justice in this city;

Resolved by the Council that the Treasurer of this City be directed to set aside for the year 1901 a fund amounting to \$100.00 to be known as the "Criminal Contingent Fund" and the said Treasurer is directed to pay out the same on the order of the Finance Committee of this Council.

Which was adopted

Mr Embrey, Chairman Street Committee asked for the sum of \$200.00 which he said would complete the annual appropriation for Streets and on motion of Mr Chancellor the amount of \$300.00 was ordered to be placed to the credit of the Street Committee.

Mr Embrey also presented a petition of sundry citizens asking that Wolfe Street be opened from Prince Edward to Spottswood Street.

Which on motion was referred to the Street Committee to [Page 386] ascertain the cost of said work.

Mr Jones, Chairman of Schools, presented and had read a letter from Dr. Rosebro, President of the Fredericksburg College stating that some of the scholars sent to College by the Council were not doing as well as they should and recommending that such scholars be withdrawn and others substituted. On motion of Capt McCracken, Dr. Rosebro's suggestions were adopted and the Committee on Schools were authorized withdraw such in affective pupils and substitute such others from the Town as in the judgment of the said Committee was advisable.

Mr Jones stated that the 3rd quarter's payment had been made on the Council's agreement with Fredericksburg College.

The Mayor reported fines collected and paid to Treasurer \$45 and that the police had performed their duty

Capt McCracken presented and had read a petition signed by 33 citizens pray that "Charlotte Street, between Mr Bowering's corner and the Mill Race be filled up &c"

And moved that the same be referred to the Street Committee to ascertain cost of said work and report same to the Council, which was adopted.

On motion of Mr Bradford the Council adjourned

Resolved by the Council that the Treasurer of the City pay to C T Hookway, contractor the sum of \$3,299.70, that being the amount certified by N Wilson Davis, engineer to be due said Contractor as of March 5th 1901.

And said Treasurer shall charge said account to the Sewer construction and the same shall be reimbursed to the Treasury so soon as the sewer bonds are sold and the proceeds thereof paid into the Treasurer, which was adopted.

And Maj Embrey, chairman of said joint committee

Presented a bill of \$200 of N Wilson Davis, Engineer, on account of services to the City in superintendence of sewer construction together with the following resolution

Resolved by the Council: that the Treasurer of the City pay to N Wilson Davis, engineer, the sum of \$200.00 on account of his services to the City in Superintendence of Sewer Construction

And said Treasurer shall charge said account to the Sewer Construction and the same shall be reimbursed to the Treasury so soon as the Sewer Bonds are sold and the proceeds thereof paid in to the Treasurer, which resolution was adopted.

On motion Col Cole, the Council adjourned M G Willis, Mayor James P Corbin, Clerk [Page 388]

Col Cole offered the following

Resolved by the Council that a Committee composed of the following citizens, viz; William D Scott, A M Garner, John M Griffin, E T Baker and J S Wallace, be and the same is hereby appointed and said Committee is clothed with full power and discretion to determine the amount of money to be to the said owners respectively in Fredericksburg through whose land the City Sewer has been or is to be laid as a just compensation therefor, and to offer in the name of the Council to such land owners the said amount, so determined, and said Committee shall report to the Council the acceptance or rejection of said offer. Which was adopted.

Mr Rowe presented and had read a communication [Page 389] from Mr G H Morrison in reference to the sidewalk in front of his residence on Lee Street.

After some discussion Mr Jones offered the following;

Resolved that the City Surveyor be instructed to survey and establish a permanent grade line for Street and side walk on west side of Lee Avenue between Hanover and Charlotte streets the cost to be ascertained by the Street Committee and reported to the Council at once, which was adopted.

And

Mr Jones offered the following;

Resolved, that the City Surveyor be requested to establish the permanent grade line of Street and sidewalk of Hanover Street Southside from the Canal to Fair Street, which was adopted.

Mr Rowe presented and had read a communication from Mrs M E Beck, asking that \$25.00 damages be allowed her for injury to her cellar & contents of same by overflow water during the heavy rainfall on October 7th 1900.

On motion of Mr Wroten the same was laid on the table.

Mr Perry presented and had read a communication from Mr W D Williams requesting permission to lay a railroad track on Lower Main Street from the R F & P Rail Road to the Machine Shop of said Williams, for the purpose of hauling heavy freight & machinery to and from his shop and for testing engines &c Which on motion of Mr Wroten was referred to the Street Committee with the request that they investigate the matter and report thereon to the Council

On motion the Council adjourned M G Willis, Mayor James P Corbin, Clerk [Page 390]

At a called meeting of the Common Council of the City of Fredericksburg, Virginia held in the Council Chamber of said City on Wednesday the 27th day of March 1901, at 8 o'clock PM;

The meeting was called to order and the Mayor stated it had been called at the request of Mr Perry to consider a petition of sundry citizens concerning sewerage

Whereupon, Mr Perry presented and had read a petition signed by fifteen residents and tax payers on Lower Main Street asking that a lateral or extension be put in to extend along lower Main Street from the

Rail Road to the top of the grade on Main Street about opposite the Weems line Wharf; and from that point to the Gas House discharging into the Main Street sewer at Griffin's corner and into the Western Sewer at the Gas House."

Mr Rowe moved that the said petition be referred to the Joint Committee on Sewerage and Street improvement with instructions to said Committee to ascertain from some competent engineer and report the cost of said addition to the sewerage, with plans and specifications for same at the next regular meeting of this body.

A recorded vote on the motion was called for and had with the following result

Against the motion Messrs Hurkamp, Gately, Bradford and Perry 4 and the motion was declared adopted

On motion of Mr Perry the rules were suspended for general business and

Mr Bradford offered the following, seconded by Mr Rowe;

Resolved by the Council that the Joint-Committee on Sewerage and Street improvement report to the next meeting of this Council what action the Council shall take in relation to the private sewers laid in the streets of this City; and in the meantime, that said Committee have said private sewers inspected to ascertain their sanitary condition, and whether any immediate action is necessary to render them wholesome. Which was unanimously adopted.

Col Cole reported that the Commerce Street Bridge over the canal was in bad condition.

Mr Wroten moved that the Street Committee be requested [Page 391] to ascertain the cost of a new bridge over the canal at Commerce Street and report to the next meeting of the Council.

Mr. Perry presented and had read a paper purporting to be from the petitioners who asked for the opening of Wolfe Street, by petition read at the February meeting of the Council & referred to the Street Committee, and moved that the Street Committee be instructed to report on said petition a the next regular meeting of the Council, which motion was adopted.

On motion of Mr Bradley the Council adjourned. M G Willis, Mayor James P Corbin, Clerk

A protest of said Hookway touching said estimate of Engineer Davis was read & field with the estimate. Col Cole also presented a bill of Engineer N Wilson Davis on account of his services in superintending the construction of the sewers amounting to \$200.00 which was ordered to be paid. Also on bill of Rubber Company for printing Sewer & Street Improvement bonds amounting to \$40.00 and a bill of E D Cole for express paid on said Bonds amounting to 30¢ was on motion ordered paid [Page 392]

Col Cole stated that 36 - \$500 sewer bonds amounting to \$18,000 had been duly signed and delivered to the Conway, Gordon & Garnett National Bank and that the same had been paid for according to the bid of said Bank for said bonds viz; the sum of \$18054.00 and that said sum had been paid over by the Fire Committee to the Treasurer of this City as evidenced the said Treasurer's receipt, which receipt on motion of Capt McCracken was ordered to be spread on the records which is accordingly done as follows \$18054.00

An Ordinance imposing Taxes in the City of Fredericksburg for the year ending April 30th 1902 for the support of the City Government, the payment of the interest on the City debt and for other expenses and providing for the collection thereof

1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Fredericksburg in the manner following that is to say, there shall be an annual license tax assessed and paid by all persons and firms in the City engaged in the different descriptions of business, professions and occupations named in this ordinance and enumerated below for the year beginning on the 1st of May 1901.

The license tax shall be assessed and collected at the following rates and paid on or before the 1st of May

- 1. On every license to a Steam boat, steam ship, or other transportation agency (other than express companies) in this city the specified tax shall be \$35.00. [Page 394]
- 2. On every license to any person renting houses, farms or other real estate for compensation or profit, the tax shall be \$15.00
- 3. On every agent for the sale of books or maps, or canvasser for any book, newspaper, periodical, magazine, map, engraving, or picture, or solicitor for subscriptions thereto, ten dollars (\$10.00)
- 4. On every agent for copying pictures, fifteen dollars (\$15.00)
- 5. On the agent of each incorporated insurance company doing business in this city, thirty five dollars (\$35) But this shall not apply to the agent of resident insurance companies doing business in the City, upon whom the tax shall be ten dollars (\$10)
- 6. On every agent for hiring labor, ten dollars (\$10)
- 7. On every mercantile agent or reporter reporting the financial standing and credit of persons engaged in business, twenty-five dollars (\$25)
- 8. On every agent for the sale of real estate, residing or keeping an office in the City, thirty dollars (\$30) Attorneys, Doctors &c
- 9. On every attorney-at-law, physicians, conveyancer, dentist, surveyor, civil engineer, the gross amount of whose professional receipt for the year ending April 30, 1901 was less than \$1000, ten dollars (\$10). Where the gross amount of their professional receipts for the same time was \$1000 and less than \$1500, fifteen dollars (\$15). Where such receipts were \$1500 and less than \$2000, twenty dollars (\$20), and for \$2000 and over, twenty five dollars (\$25). All persons other than duly licensed attorneys-at-law who for compensation shall prepare deeds, contracts, wills, or other writings shall be deemed conveyancers. Auctioneers

- 10. On every general auctioneer, forty five dollars (\$45) whether he derives any compensation for his services or not.
- 11. Concession crier, ten dollars (\$10.) Billiard Tables, Bowling alleys &c

- 12. On every license permitting a billiard or Pool Saloon to be kept in the City (whether a charge is made for playing or not) the tax shall be twenty-five dollars (\$25) and each additional table ten dollars (\$10).
- 13. On each bagatelle, Jenny Lind Or Dexter table ten dollars (\$10) and if said table is kept in the same house with or in any way attached to a bar room, hotel, boarding or eating house, this tax is imposed whether any charge is made by the proprietor thereof for the use of said table or not, and whether said table is used or not.
- 14. On every license permitting a bowling saloon or ten-pin alley (whether a charge is made for playing or not) to be kept in this City, the tax shall be ten dollars (\$10) on each alley.

Bill Posters

15. On every bill-poster five dollars (\$5)

Bakers and Confectioners

16. On every person keeping a bakery or manufacturing confectionary, other than merchants, ten dollars (\$10)

Boarding Houses, Hotels, Eating Houses &c

- 17. On every person keeping a boarding house ten dollars (\$10). Any person other than the keeper of a hotel, eating house or restaurant who shall furnish for consumption, board and lodging to any number of persons not less than five, for a period or time of one month or more shall be deemed a boarding house keeper. Any boarding house keeper who shall take boarders for a less period than one month, shall be deemed a hotel keeper.
- 18. On every person keeping a hotel, twenty dollars (\$20), but this license shall not cover the right to sell wines, spirituous or malt liquors.
- 19. On every person keeping an eating house or restaurant, sixteen dollars (\$16). Any person who shall cook or otherwise furnish for consumption diet or refreshment of any kind for casual visitors at his house and sold for consumption thereon and who is not the keeper of a hotel or boarding house, shall be deemed to keep an eating house or restaurant, but the refreshments herein named shall not consist of wines, spirituous or malt liquor, except where parties have license to sell the same.
- 20. On every person selling upon the street or other public place snacks and such like eatables five dollars (\$5), or \$1.50 per quarter.

Bankers, Brokers &c

- 21. On every private banker, two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250). The term "private banker" shall include all persons conducting the business of a stock, note, bond, money or bill broker.
- 22. On every pawn broker twenty-five dollars (\$25)

Itinerant Doctors

- 23. On every chiropodist, cancer, eye or other itinerant doctor or optician ten dollars (\$10) Photographic Artists
- 24. On every daguerrean or photograph artist, twenty dollars (\$20).

Express Companies

25. On every express company having an office or doing business in the city, thirty dollars (\$30) and no railroad company shall do an express business in the City without first obtaining a license under this clause.

Junk Dealers

26. On any person trading in any kind of second hand articles, junk, old metals, rages, or other like commodities, thirty five dollars (\$35) and for each canvasser or agent canvassing the city for the purpose of buying junk or other matter for junk dealers or themselves, fifteen dollars (\$15)

Livery Stables

27. On every keeper of a livery stables thirty dollars (\$30)

28. On every two-horse hack, phaeton, omnibus, carriage, or wagon used for hire, eight dollars (\$8) on every buggy used for hire four dollars; on every one horse wagon, dray or cart used for hire four dollars (\$4).

Liquor Dealers

[Page 396]

- 29. On every person selling by wholesale wine, ardent spirits, malt liquors, or any mixture thereof, one hundred and sixty dollars (\$160), but where a person sells only malt liquors by wholesale the tax shall be twenty five dollars (\$25).
- 30. Retail liquors, including the privilege of drinking where sold, one hundred and twenty dollars (\$120). Retail malt fifteen dollars (\$15).
- 31. On every person distilling or manufacturing ardent spirits, twenty five dollars (\$25); and on manufacturing malt liquors, ten dollars (\$10)
- 32. A wholesale liquor dealer desiring to sell liquors by retail may do so by paying one-half of specific tax on a retail liquor license additional.
- 33. On every rectifier, twenty five dollars (\$25)

Merchants

34. On every license to a merchant or mercantile firm, the tax shall be graduated as follows; where the amount of purchases for the year ending April 1, 1901 did not exceed \$1000 the tax shall be ten dollars (\$10), where the purchases for the year did not exceed \$2000 the tax shall be fifteen dollars (\$15). On all purchases over \$2000, the tax shall be fifty cents on the one hundred dollars of said purchases, and upon all purchases over two thousand dollars and less than twenty five thousand dollars there shall be a tax of thirty cents on the one hundred dollars of said purchases.

Merchant tailors, lumber merchants, furniture merchants, butchers, green grocers, hucksters, dealers in coal, ice or wood shall be considered in this section, but dealers in wood, coal or ice paying license tax under this section may peddle the same from vehicles without paying additional tax.

- 35. On every commission merchant forty-five dollars (\$45) Every person buying or selling on commission shall be deemed a commission merchant and that whether the articles bought or sold are bought or sold in this city or elsewhere.
- 36. Every agent for the sale of musical instruments, sewing machines, fertilizers, or other articles, twenty dollars (\$20)
- 37. On every person retailing tobacco, cigars, snuff five dollars (\$5)

Medicines

38. On every person engaged in the sale on the streets or other public places of patent or quack medicines or any other articles by auction or otherwise or exhibiting the same two dollars and a half (\$2.50) for each day or night the same may be done. This license shall be a personal privilege, and only be granted by order of the Mayor.

Oysters and Fish

- 39. On every person selling oysters or fresh fish (other than duly licensed merchants) five dollars (\$5) Patent rights
- 40. On every person selling patent rights, ten dollars (\$10)

Peddlers &c

[Page 397]

41. On every peddler, fifty dollars (\$50) and every person selling to consumers by sample, card, or representation or soliciting or taking orders from any other than from merchants or other persons dealing in the articles so sold shall be deemed a peddler.

Railroad Tickets

42. On every person buying or selling railroad tickets other than the duly authorized agent of some rail road company with a depot in this city, ten dollars (\$10) Swings

43. On every proprietor of a revolving swing, flying tournament or machine of like nature for each week ten dollars (\$10)

Shooting Galleries

44. On the proprietor of every shooting gallery five dollars (\$5)

Theaters, Shows, Circuses &c

- 45. On every proprietor or lessee of a public or private building to be used for any theatrical or secular performance, panorama, or any other public exhibition show or entertainment, whether any charge for admission thereto is made or not, fifteen dollars (\$15), and no building shall be used for any such purpose until said tax is paid. But this section shall not apply to any exhibition held in any church or building owned or used as a place of worship by any religious congregation in the city.
- 46. The specific license tax on every show, every circus, and on the exhibition of a menagerie fifty dollars (\$50) per day, on the outside shows, whether attached thereto or not, five dollars (\$5) each.
- 47. On every license to a theatrical performance of any kind whatever, professional juggler, necromancer or any other exhibition of a like kind, whether money or any other thing is charged therefor or not, the tax on each exhibition or performance by day or night shall be three dollars (\$3); ten dollars (\$10) for six consecutive days by the same company but when such exhibition performance or lecture is held or given for any charitable or literary purpose within the City, and the net proceeds actually applied or bestowed within the City to said charitable or literary purpose, the Mayor shall have power and authority to give a permit for such exhibition, performance or lecture free from all tax or charge; and every lecture included in the above clause shall be only granted upon the order of the Mayor. And each exhibition shall pay the city collector the sum of seventy five cents for collecting, provided however that said collector has to leave his regular place of business to make such collection. Such license tax shall be paid to the city Collector before any exhibition is held

Telegraph Companies

48. On every telegraph company having an office in the city, thirty five dollars (\$35)

Telephone Companies

49. On every telephone company having an office in the city, twenty five dollars (\$25)

[Page 398]

Dealers in Futures

50. Every person who shall conduct the business of dealing in what is known as futures in grain or other produce or merchandise, shall pay a specific license tax of twenty five dollars (\$25) and if a similar business be done in railroad or other stocks or bonds an additional license of twenty five dollars (\$25), but this shall not be deemed as interfering with the stock or bond dealing of regular bankers.

Guarantee Insurance Companies

51. On every license to a person or firm to act as agent or solicitors for any company guaranteeing official or other bonds, not having its principal or home office the in the City, there shall be a specific license for doing business in this City of twenty dollars (\$20) for each company represented.

Wagon Yards

52. Every person or persons keeping a wagon yard in this city shall pay upon each such yard so kept a specific license tax of ten dollars (\$10) for each year or fractional part thereof.

Fortune Telling or Palmistry

- 53. Fortune telling or Palmistry when charge is made, either for admission or hand reading five dollars (\$5)
- I. Whenever a license shall be especially required by law on any business, profession or employment it shall be lawful to grant a license for said business, professional or employment. Where the ordinance aforesaid does not clearly define and provide for the same, the license may be granted according to the law, which governs in similar cases, and be subject to such restrictions as appertains thereto, and the Mayor of the City may authorize the granting of such license, which shall be deemed a personal privilege.

II. All other license taxes imposed by this ordinance are subject to a pro rata deduction when the same are issued after the beginning of the year to which this ordinance applies; provided that the tax on the license issued shall always be assess as of the first day of the quarter in which issued and shall cover the period until the 30th April next succeeding.

III. It shall be the duty of the Commissioner of the Revenue to keep a book in which he shall classify all the branches of business and occupations upon which a license tax is imposed by this ordinance and show the amount of assessment made of each license the name of the person against whom assessed and the person for which said license is issued. At the end of each quarter commencing with that ending on the 30th April 1901, he shall deliver to the Finance Committee extracts from said books showing the entries thereon made during the preceding quarter, properly classified. These extracts shall be certified under oath.

IV. Any person who shall engage in, or exercise any business, employment or profession without license is [Page 399] required by law or shall in any manner violate the license or revenue laws of the city if as specified fine is imposed for such violations, shall pay a fine of not less than five dollars (\$5) or more than ten dollars (\$10) for each offense.

V. Every person or firm commencing business after the first day of May, and who shall fail to obtain a license within ten days thereafter shall be subject to the same penalties as in section IV.

VI. Every license granted for the unexpired portion of the term heretofore mentioned shall be charged pro rata until otherwise provided. But no license shall be issued for a less sum than two dollars (\$2) nor granted for a longer period than to the first of May 1902.

VII. The City Collector shall at the expiration of each week report to the Treasurer the amount of all money received by him for licenses, and pay the same over to the Treasurer, for which he shall be allowed two and one half percent.

VIII. The Commissioner of the Revenue shall, before the first of March of each year ascertain the names of persons and firms who are engaged in any of the occupations, professions or businesses named or referred to in this license ordinance. He shall list and keep each list in his office and report copies of such list to the Common Council and Mayor on the 1st of April annually. He shall assess each person or firm named in the list with the license tax imposed by the ordinance and he is not authorized to release or discharge any of the persons or firms enumerated in this list who are engaged in the occupation, profession, or business upon which license tax is imposed without a judicial decision in the case. IX. Should there be an assessment made and not paid, it shall be the duty of the City Collector to make collection by levy and sale of the goods and chattels of the person assessed as is provided by the Act of the General Assembly of Virginia for the assessment ley and collection of taxes. A commission of 5 percent shall be allowed on collections so made from default or persons and such commissions shall be paid by the person or persons in default.

X. A discount of five per cent will be allowed on all licenses paid on or before May 15th of each year. XI. Be it further ordained that all laws ordinances and resolutions that are in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Councilmen G W Wroten, W E Bradley, W S Embrey, J P Rowe, W H Hurkamp, C W Jones, M J Gately, M S Chancellor, S S Bradford, and Lawrence Perry.

The meeting was called to order by the Mayor, the minutes of the last regular and called meetings were read and approved.

Mr Embrey of Finance Committee presented a bill of the Commercial Printing Co amounting to \$4.25 which on motion was ordered to be paid, and he also presented three bill of the Free Lance for printing &c say \$3.50, \$1.75; & \$4.25 amounting to \$9.50 which on motion was ordered to be paid.

Mr Wroten Chairman Public Property Committee made a report setting out that the Committee had found it impossible to secure workmen to paint the Free Bridge last fall as directed by the Council in October last, and that the work had been purposely put off this Spring to let the frost get out of the iron; and further reported that a majority of the Committee were in favor of having the work done by contract rather than be day labor, and submitted bids for said work as follows

R L Jefferson \$427.50

And recommended that the work of the free bridge be done by contract.

Whereupon Mr Bradley moved that the action of the Council heretofore taken directing said work on Free Bridge to be done by day labor be reconsidered; that the report of the Committee on Public Property be received and the recommendations contained therein be adopted and further that the Committee be authorized to let the work to the lowest bidder and if the Committee so desire that it be empowered to secure the services of an expert in such work to see that it is properly done, which motion was adopted.

Mr Bradford stated that the bridge over the Canal at the north end of Washington Avenue had been taken up by the contractor who is dredging the canal and that the timbers in the bridge were found to be rotten and unsafe and not fit to be [Page 402] put back and used again, and that said Contractor would put in new timber free of cost for the work provided the City would furnish the timber.

Whereupon Mr Wroten moved that the City furnish said contractor with suitable timber to replace said bridge which said motion was adopted

Mr Jones Chairman of School Committee reported that the last quarter's tuition under the agreement with Fredericksburg College had been paid to said College and that the Committee had named Sidney Hunter to fill the vacancy in the City's quota of pupils in said College.

The Mayor reported fines collected and paid to Treasurer for month ending April \$30.00 and same for month ending May \$35.00 making in all \$65.00 and he also reported that the Police had done their duty

Mr Wroten asked on behalf of F L W Green, permission for said Green to erect a shed at the back door of his store opening on to the Market Yard, and on motion of Mr Wroten the privilege was granted, work to be done under the supervision of Public Property Committee.

Mr Bradford, City Surveyor, who was directed to ascertain and report grades of street and sidewalk on Lee Avenue and on Hanover Street from Canal to Freeman's Corner with cost of grading, reported in writing with profiles attached and on motion of Mr Wroten the report was received and ordered to be filed for future use.

Mr Bradford presented a bill for rodman &c necessary help in making requisite surveys amounting to \$4.30, which on motion was ordered to be paid.

Whereupon Capt McCracken moved that Mr Bradford be allowed the sum of \$30.00 for his professional services in making the surveys and profile drawings necessary in the proper preparation of his report, which was adopted.

Whereupon Mr Bradford entered a protest against said allowance on the ground that he was a member of the Council and should not receive compensation for his services.

A communication from the Clerk of the School Board stating that the terms of office of W H Hurkamp and Isaac Hirsh as School Trustees from the Lower and Upper wards respectively had expired on the 4th day of April last was read, and on motion the Council proceeded to elect their successors, Messrs W H Hurkamp from the Lower Ward, and Isaac Hirsh from the Upper Ward were placed in nomination and a ballot being had they were declared duly elected as such [Page 403] School Trustees for the terms ending on the 4th day of April 1904.

On motion of Mr Jones the Council adjourned M G Willis, Mayor James P Corbin, Clerk

The meeting was called to order by the Mayor and Maj Embrey being recognized, stated that the meeting had been called for the purpose of entertaining the following resolution which he offered as follows towit:

Whereas Major-General Daniel Butterfield has erected a splendid monument at Fredericksburg, Virginia to commemorate the valor and devotion of the Fifth Corps of the Army of the Potomac commanded by him in the battle of Fredericksburg, and has presented the same to the Fredericksburg and adjacent National Battlefield Memorial Park Association of which he is an honored member, thus testifying his profound interest in the object of said Association, which is to establish here a magnificent memorial of the heroism of both the great Armies whose join valor and sacrifice have made the Battlefields of Spottsylvania immortal.

And whereas, said monument is to be unveiled on May the 30th 1901 at 3 o'clock PM Resolved, by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Fredericksburg, that said body will attend the unveiling and will march in the procession and they invite all the City officials to do likewise. Resolved further, that they respectfully request all places of business to be closed from 2:30 o'clock PM to 4 o'clock PM on that day; and that the citizens generally attend.

Mr Wroten reported the contract to paint Free Bridge had been awarded to Mr Jefferson for \$427.50.

Mr Embrey Chairman Street Committee presented the annual report of the Committee with expenditures amounting to \$2,116.83. The appropriation being \$2200.00, leaving a balance of \$83.17 to the credit of the Committee on motion the report was received and ordered filed.

Mr M S Chancellor Chairman Water Committee requested that Capt S J Quinn, Supt of City Water Works be permitted to read his report for the year, which report the Water Committee adopts and presents as the report of said Committee. Said report shows expenditures amounting to \$1320.56, which is \$320.56 in excess of the annual appropriation which is \$1000. The report further shows [Page 406] the receipts from water to be \$6610.01 and the sums paid out amount to \$3720.56, leave a net balance for the City of \$2889.45

On Motion the report was received and ordered to be filed and the amount of \$320.56 ordered to be placed to the credit of the Water Committee.

Mr Bradley, Chairman Committee on Alms and Alms House presented the annual report of said

Committee showing disbursements as follows Alms-House proper
City poor out side of Alms House \$475.14
Making in all \$1403.22

Which is \$403.22 in excess of the annual appropriation.

On motion the report was received and ordered to be filed and the amount of \$403.22 was ordered to be placed to the credit of the Committee on Alms & Alms-House

Mr Gately, Chairman Health & Police Committee offered the annual report of said Committee, showing disbursements of \$187.13 which is \$87.13 in excess of the annual appropriation; on motion the report was received and ordered to be filed and the amount of \$87.73 ordered to be placed to the credit of said Committee.

Mr Jones, Chairman Committee on Schools said he had not written report, that the school year had been a successful one with the attendance larger than in any previous year

The Mayor reported fines to June \$27.55

Dog tax 2.55 \$30.10

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Fredericksburg, Va

That the following taxes on personal property (real and personal) shall be assessed, levied and paid for the year 1901-1902 for the support of the municipal government, public schools, for the poor, for the lighting of the Streets, to pay interest on bonds, and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption of the City debt, viz:

- 1st On every male person over 21 years of age (not legally exempt) 50 cents
- 2nd On all real and personal property, income, toll bridges, monied capital, in any business, investments in bonds in or out of the State, and stock in incorporated companies, on every (\$100) one hundred dollars \$1.15
- 3rd On any property taxed by the State and not included in the foregoing, the tax shall be the same at that fixed by the State.
- 4th A deduction of five percent shall be made on all taxes paid on or before the 15th day of October next. 5th On all taxes remaining unpaid on and after the 15th day of October next, there shall be added five percent and interest from that date till paid, and the Collector shall proceed to collect the same in the manner prescribed by law and the ordinances of the City.
- 6th The Taxes imposed by this ordinance shall be payable in National currency of the United States and in the coupons of the 7 per cent bonds and in the coupons of all other bonds of the City, and on the first day of November next (without rebate) in pursuance of the ordinance [Page 410] on that subject On motion the said Tax Bill for the year 1901-1902 was adopted.

Capt McCracken, Chairman Light Committee stated that the Light Committee thought some steps should be taken to light the city during the period required for repairs of the work out at the Electric Plant and stated that arrangements [Page 422] could be made for moving the dynamo from the power house of the City's Plant to the Southern Foundry & Machine Works which Foundry would furnish steam power to run the dynamo for \$9.00 per night and that the removal of the dynamo from the power plant would be agreed to by Kingsbury Samuel & Co the contractor who had not yet turned the plant over to the City provided the City paid the electrician now in charge \$4.00 a day for his services while running the dynamo at said Foundry, which would make a cost of \$14.00 per night.

Whereupon Mr Wroten moved that the Light Committee be empowered to make a contract with the Southern Foundry and Machine Works in accordance with the above and move the dynamo for the Electric Light Plant to said Foundry, which motion was adopted.

On motion of Mr Bradley the Council adjourned

Capt McCracken, Chairman of the Light Committee said that Mr Edward J Willis, the engineer and Mr St George R Fitzhugh, the City Attorney were present and that the Light Committee wishes Mr Willis as the engineer in charge of the construction of the Electric Light Plant to give the Council his opinion as to the cause of the wash-out on the 19th instant at the said plant; and Mr Willis addressed the Council and exonerated the contractor Mr Livingston from all blame for the accident, and said that while he did not consider himself legally responsible in any way, he had begun the day after the wash-out to have repairs made and felt sure that the Council would meet him half way in adjustment of the matter satisfactory to all parties concerned.

Mr Fitzhugh then addressed the Council and said as the City Attorney that there was neither legal nor moral [Page 423] responsibility for the accident on the contractor, Mr Livingston, and that he did not consider Mr Willis legally responsible but he did consider that there was a moral responsibility resting on Mr Willis, which Mr Willis had promptly and fully recognized in the action he proposed to take. Mr Jones then offered the following

Whereas it has been represented to the Council that the wash-out at the Electric Plant was occasioned by the settling of the earth beneath the concrete head-race intended to transmit the water from the head water of the canal to the power house of the electric plant and whereas Mr Edward J Willis, the Engineer, whilst disclaiming all legal liability for said damage has voluntarily to bear at his own expense all the expense to repair said damage, except the cost of a metal flume to transmit said water, and the cost of a gate to be erected at the head water of the canal and the cost of placing said metal flume in position and connecting the same with the power house

It is resolved by the Council that said offer of Mr Willis is accepted and the Council hereby directs the Light Committee to procure under the direction of Mr Willis a suitable metal flume for the purpose aforesaid and to erect under said direction a proper gate and to take all other proper steps as speedily as possible to complete said Electric Plant'

A recorded vote being called for on the resolution it was had with the following result For the resolution Messrs Cole, Bradley, Rowe, McCracken, Hurkamp, Jones, Bradford and Perry

Against the resolution, nobody and it was declared unanimously adopted and

Capt McCracken further stated that Mr John C Melville one of the owners of the Woolen Mills adjoining the site of the Electric Plant had offered the use of water power free to the City, for running the dynamo and that the Light Committee had deemed it to the interests of the City not to carry into effect the arrangement authorized by the Council on September 21st inst to move said dynamo to the Southern Foundry & Machine works, and had accepted Mr Melville's kind offer.

On motion of Col Cole the action of the Light Committee was sustained.

The Mayor reported fines collected \$31.50 and that same [Page 425] had been paid over to the Treasurer whose receipt therefor was read; The Mayor also stated that the police of the City had done their duty and

the Mayor further reported that he had issued and collected tax on 206 dogs – 172 males, 34 females amounting to \$223.00, which had been paid over to the Treasurer whose receipt for said amount was read and Col Cole mover that the usual fee of 15 cents for each dog license be allowed the Mayor, which was adopted and the Mayor stated that he had deemed it judicious to appoint Mr R L Jefferson a special policeman on the 9th of October when there was a crowd I the City, and asked that the Council order one dollar be paid to said Jefferson, for said service, which on motion of Col Cole was so ordered.

Maj Embrey presented a petition signed by numerous residents in the vicinity asking that an Electric Light be placed at the corner of Princess Anne and Princess Elizabeth Streets and

Mr Bradley moved that said petition be referred to the Light Committee to make recommendation to the Council as to the location of any additional lights, and

Col Cole moved as a substitute that so soon as the Electric Light plant is accepted by the City, the prayer of the petition be granted, a recorded vote being called for on the substitute was had as follows

For Messrs Cole, Wroten, Embrey, Gately, Chancellor, Bradford and Perry = 7

Against Messrs Bradley, Rowe, McCracken and Jones = 4

And the substitute was declared adopted

A petition signed by numerous shippers and business men of the City asking that an Electric Light be place on lower Water Street near the Weem's Wharf to replace the light formerly there but which has been done away with, said petition was accompanied by a letter addressed to Col E D Cole stating that "the Weems Line will pay for the expense of the extension for labor, poles & wire" said letter bearing date October 11th 1901, and signed W D Scott Agt was read and

Mr Bradley moved that the petition be granted on the conditions raised in said letter, and that light also be placed at the college corner Prince Edward and Lewis streets at the corner of Charles and Fauquier streets at the corner of Main and Pitt Streets, at the corner of George and Charles streets and at the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac Rail Road Company's Depot, so soon as the Electric Light Plant is accepted by the City, which motion was adopted.

A letter for the Fredericksburg Milling Company asking that it be allowed to complete the repairs to its flume [Page 426] which repairs were ordered to be discontinued on July 15, last was read and along with said letter was read one from Dr J. N Barney, Health officer stating that "the work could be prosecuted now with no menace to public health in my judgment" on motion said Company was allowed to resume said work under the supervision of the Street Committee.

A communication from O J Owens asking that a sewer be run on Washington Avenue from Commerce Street to corner of Amelia Street said Owens offering to pay one half of the cost of said sewer, was read, and on motion referred to the Joint Committee on Sewerage and Street improvement with request to make some recommendation thereon to the Council

Mr Rowe moved that so much of the report of the Joint Committee on Sewerage & Street Improvement which was made on September 6, 1901 as instructs its ordinance Committee to prepare an ordinance regulating the connection with sewers, be reconsidered, which motion was adopted.

Col Cole also presented an application of Judge A W Wallace, setting out that he was the owner of a registered coupon 7% bond of this City No. 239 for \$500.00, that the coupon on said bond for \$17.50 payable November 1, 1901 was lost and applied for payment thereof by the City; whereupon it is ordered that so soon as Judge A W Wallace shall file with the Treasurer of this City a bond in the penalty of \$20.00 conditioned to pay all loss and damages to the City of Fredericksburg by reason of said payment, said Treasurer should pay to said A W Wallace the sum of \$17.50 along with said application was the certificate of the Treasurer that said coupon had not been presented for payment up to this date.

Capt McCracken, Chairman Light Committee asked for [Page 428] an appropriation of \$696.80 to pay Wm Livingston the contractor of the Electric Plant for extra work some on said plant which extra amount has been approved by Engineer Willis and on motion of Mr Bradley the sum of \$696.80 was ordered to be placed to the credit of the Light Committee for said purpose.

Mr Gately, Chairman of Health & Police Committee offered the following which was on motion referred to the ordinance Committee, viz;

Resolved, that all physicians practicing medicine in the City of Fredericksburg, shall report all cases of infections or contagious diseases to the Mayor, who shall have the premises where such diseases exist or have existed fumigated or disinfected as he may deem necessary.

The Mayor reported fines collected to date \$30.00 and produced the Treasurer's receipt for same and further reported that the Police had done their duty.

The Mayor presented the acknowledgment made by Mrs William McKinley, widow of our late President to the notions [?] of sympathy and regret sent by the Council, and on motion of Captain McCracken same is ordered to be spread upon on record, which is accordingly done as follows

Captain McCracken then moved that the rules be suspended for the purpose of considering an ordinance concerning the management of the Electric Light Plant which motion was adopted. And Capt McCracken presented the following, viz;

2nd Any violation of this ordinance shall subject the offender to a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$2.00 for each offense.
