# Col E D Cole, President in the Chair

Mr J P Rowe of the Street Committee asked for a special appropriation of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to the Street Committee

On motion of Mr Young the sum of one thousand dollars was appropriated to the Street Committee by the following recorded vote:

Ayes, Rowe, Garner, Dannehl, Warden, Somerville, Young, Cole (7 votes)

Nos, Bradley (1 vote)

Mr Somerville moved, seconded by Mr Young that the Clerk of this Council notify the Mayor of the City to carry out the Ordinance with regard to cellar doors along the side walks. Adopted by unanimous vote of the Council.

Mr Young of the Light Committee reported that the new wheels for the Electric Plant had arrived and would be put in just as soon as possible, his Committee expected to furnish light during the time [Page 204] that if his Committee were not successful we would be without street lights for a short period, but he hoped this would not be necessary.

Mr Young, Chairman of Light Committee presented the following estimate of the probable cost of extending gas mains along the Boulevard and the two streets crossing it.

The Light Committee, Mr Young, said recommended that the above work be done at once, as the people were demanding the Gas, and it would be as wise expenditure of money in the part of the City, as it would pay a handsome revenue in return.

Mr Bradley moved, seconded by Mr Garner, that the gas Committee be instructed to go ahead and do the work at the estimated cost of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00)

#### Col E D Cole in the Chair

Col Cole of the Water Committee, in the absence of Chairman Lane, who was detained at home by sickness, stated his Committee had not closed up Hunter's Foundry Pump or well as ordered: that he understood a largely signed petition had been prepared asking that it be kept open; that if it was closed it would be a great hardship to the people in that section of the City, and he expected the petition was in the hands of Mr Bradley and would come up later. Mr Bradley stated this petition was prepared and he expected to have it ready for presentation, but for some reason it had not given him; that in his opinion no injury was being done by the delay, and it would be brought up later.

Cole Cole, by request, presented an ordinance which he stated was from the Rappahannock Electric Light and Power Co, asking for a Franchise to furnish Electricity in the shape of Power and Lighting in Fredericksburg Va

On motion of Mr Somerville referred to the Ordinance Committee [Page 205]

Mr Dannehl of the Ordinance Committee said his Committee was not ready to report on the Ordinance in regard to a Franchise for the Fredericksburg Power Company, referred to his Committee at last meeting of the Council. That due notice will be given for a hearing to those making application, and those who wanted their interests protected.

Mr Mills of Public Interests Committee said that the question of a Normal School was now before the Legislature and Fredericksburg ought to have it, and he believed could get it by limited[?] effort. On motion of Mr Young it was resolved that the Public Interest Interests Committee be instructed to add to its Committee such members of this Council and Citizens as they shall deem wise and immediately take up the question of location of Normal School with our representatives in the General Assembly.

Mr Somerville, of Schools, submitted the following report:

Your Committee consisting of the Joint Committee of Schools and Public Property beg leave to state that they have met from time to time, and carefully considered the matters entrusted to them viz; the selecting of a site for the new school building, securing plans and specifications and ascertaining probable cost of same, together with ways and means of securing funds for constructing said building, and that at a meeting held on January 9, 1908, at which meeting we invited the City Attorney, the Superintendent of Public Schools and the Chairman of the Finance Committee to be present we unanimously adopted the following recommendations:

1<sup>st</sup> That the present site of the Public school is recommended to the Council as the site of the New School Building.

2<sup>nd</sup> that when Mr Heflin prepares plans and specifications for what he designates a (\$30,000.00) building with 16 rooms that the Committee report to the City Council the plans and specifications for said building and the plans and specifications for an 18 room building estimated to cost (\$35,000.00) and that the Committee recommend to the Council to adopt the building estimated to cost (\$30,000.000 3<sup>rd</sup> That the City Council authorize the City Attorney to prepare an Act empowering the City to issue (\$15,000.00) worth of bonds bearing 4% interest for the erection of a Public School Building and to place same in the hands of the Delegate and Senator to have the same enacted by the Legislature. Respectfully submitted, S W Somerville, J P Rowe, Henry Warden, W E Bradley, A M Garner, Henry Dannehl (Joint Committee on School Building) [Page 206]

Mr Bradley asked that the report lay over until next meeting of the Council, when Mr Heflin will have his plans and specifications complete. And also presented the following which was unanimously adopted.

Resolved that the City Council authorize the City Attorney to prepare an Act empowering the City to issue (\$15,000.00) fifteen thousand dollars worth of 10—30 year bonds bearing 4% interest for the erecting of a Public School Building and to place the same in the hands of our delegate, Hon C O'Conor Goolrick, and Senator F W Sims to have same enacted by the Legislature.

On motion of Mr Mills, it was resolved that the plans for the School Building be ready for inspection by members of the City Council at least one week before next meeting and that said plans be given to Clerk of Council in order that members may inspect same.

Mr Bradley offered the following which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved that Hon C O'Conor Goolrick be requested to lay the Bill, which it is reported he has offered in the House of Delegates in relation to Police Justice of Fredericksburg, Va before the City Council for its consideration before pressing the same, and that the Clerk of this Council send to said Hon C O'Conor Goolrick a copy of this resolution.

On motion of Mr Dannehl, it was resolved that the Public Interests Committee consult with the City Attorney and ascertain what Legislation, if any, is necessary to annex adjacent territory to the City.

Col Cole presented a telegram from Senator F W Sims that Wednesday, Jan 22<sup>nd</sup> had been selected as the day for the hearing of the Bill to repeal the Statute of Paralleling the R F & P R R before the Committee in Richmond.

On motion of Mr Young, the Public Interests Committee was empowered to go to Richmond Va add members to its Committee and work for the repeal of the Statute paralleling the R F & P R R.

On motion of Mr Mills, the Water Committee was requested to bring in an estimate of cost of boring or driving a well at or near Hunter's Foundry and report to the Council.

On motion the Council then adjourned E D Cole, President S E Eastburn, Clerk [Page 207]

Called meeting of the City Council was held pursuant to notice in the Council Chamber January 28, 1908 at 3 o'clock PM with the following members present; Cole Bradley, Lane, Rowe, Garner, Dannehl, Masters, Somerville, Young and S E Eastburn, Clerk Col E D Cole, President in the Chair

Col Cole stated that the Council had been called at the request of the Light Committee

Mr Young of the Light Committee presented the resignation of E M Green, Superintendent of the Electric Light Plant with the recommendation of his Committee that the resignation of Supt E M Green be accepted and that Mr W K Howard be elected to fill the place for the unexpired term, and that the salary be increased to twelve hundred dollars.

The Clerk read the following letter from E M Green, former Superintendent Jan'y 28, 1908. Gentlemen: Upon the request of Mr E M Young I placed in his hands my resignation as Supt of the City Electric Light Plant. Since then I have reconsidered the matter, and ask you Gentlemen not to accept same. It is my wish to serve my unexpired term, which expires Sep 1<sup>st</sup> 1908 and guarantee to give perfect satisfaction in every respect. I acknowledge that I have been at fault in some respects but ask for the opportunity to remedy the same.

Respectfully, E M Green, Supt E L Plant.

Mr Masters moved to accept the resignation of E M Green.

Mr Dannehl moved to postpone action for 30 day, no second. Recorded vote on motion of Mr Masters to accept E M Green's resignation was as follows:

Mr Bradley moved to go into the election of Supt of the Electric Light Plant, carried. Mr Young moved, which was seconded, that the salary of the Supt of Electric Light Plant be fixed at the rate of (\$1,200.00) per year for the unexpired term. Carried by the following recorded vote. Ayes, Bradley, Rowe, Lane, Garner, Masters, Somerville, Young, Cole Nos, Dannehl

There were four applications for the office of Superintendent of Electric Light Plant; W Key Howard, E M Green, Earnest Minor, Albert Bauman. Vote was taken and W. Key Howard received all the votes and was declared elected.

On motion the rules were suspended Mr J P Rowe was excused Mr H Dannehl in the Chair

J W Masters, of the Public Interests Committee stated that E W Mills, Chairman was sick. That he had in obedience to instructions of the Council appointed other members to the Committee on location of the Normal School and that said Committee would proceed to Richmond this evening and appear before the Legislative Committee and do all they could to secure it for Fredericksburg Va and wished

to know if the City Council wished to authorize the Committee to offer inducements in the way of site and grounds.

Whereupon Col Cole offered the following resolution which was adopted. Mr Somerville voting no. Resolved: by the City Council that the Committee heretofore appointed in relation to the location of the State Female Normal School at Fredericksburg, Va be and the same is hereby authorized and empowered to communicate with the Committee of the General Assembly having the proposed Normal School in charge and to state to the Committee that the Council stands ready to donate a suitable site for said Normal School, with ample ground for all purposes of said school, and the Industrial training department to be connected therewith, and that said Committee invite said Committee of the Legislature to visit Fredericksburg, Va and to indicate what site, in or near the Corporate Limits of said City, would in the judgment of the said Committee be adequate for said Normal School and upon the report of the selection made, the Council will take appropriate action with a view to securing the same.

On motion the Council adjourned E D Cole, President S E Eastburn, Clerk [Page 209]

The President stated that the Council had been called to take suitable actions on the death of Mr E W Mills.

Mr A M Garner offered the following, which on motion of Mr Bradley was unanimously adopted. The sad fact "that in the midst of life we are in death" was forcibly illustrated on Wednesday morning last, in the sudden death of Mr Edgar W Mills, for six years an active and honored member of this body. Even before the fact of his illness was generally known in the community, the startling intelligence of his death was announced, which carried with it sadness to every heart. He was in the full enjoyment of health only a few days ago, but suddenly he dies in the prime of life and in the midst of his usefulness. In this premature death we are impressively reminded of the withering of the fruit before it is ripe, the blighting of the golden grain ere it matures, even the going

Resolved: 1<sup>st</sup> That in the untimely death of Mr E W Mills, this body has lost a valued member whose faithful services and energetic labors have resulted in lasting benefit to this community, and the City mourns. The early departure of a generous public spirited Citizen whose zeal and energy have been exerted for its growth and prosperity.

To the Honorable City Council

Gentlemen: For many years I have attended to the winding up of the City Clock in the Spire of the St Georges Episcopal Church, giving it proper attention three times each week, which it requires owning to its (short winding arrangement) for the sum of forty dollars (\$40.00) per annum. I feel that the services rendered are worth more than the sum received, and respectfully ask your honorable body for an increase of pay, for said service, say (\$75.00) per annum or (\$18.75) per quarter. This amount will be satisfactory, and is not more than moderate compensation for the time required and the labor performed.

On motion of Mr Rowe, the communication about winding of City Clock was referred to the Public Property Committee with full power to act.

Mr Young, Chairman of the Light Committee reported that in obedience to a resolution of this Council bearing date Jan'y 16<sup>th</sup> 1908 instructing the Gas Committee to go ahead and do the work of laying gas mains along the Boulevard and the two streets crossing it at an estimated cost of \$3,000.00, his Committee had purchased the pipe and the same was being placed along the line of the proposed work. He asked that the sum of \$3,000 be appropriated to the Gas Committee to pay for this work.

Mr Bradley moved that the sum of (\$3,000.00) be appropriated to the Gas Committee, as a special fund, and that so much of it as may be necessary be expended for Gas Mains on Boulevard and two cross Streets. Adopted by recorded vote; Ayes, Cole, Bradley, Lane, Rowe Goldsmith, Garner, Dannehl, Masters, Somerville, Young [Page 212]

Mr Young of the Light Committee reported that the new wheels for the City Electric Light Plant were in place and his committee expected to have it running by Monday. That the light were being run from the Woolen Mill Power.

J W Masters of the Public Interests Committee presented the following:

To the Hon Mayor and Common Council of the City of Fredericksburg Va

The undersigned, as the administrator of E W Mills, dec'd, formerly a member of the Honorable City Council of Fredericksburg and former chairman of the Public Interests Committee respectfully begs leave to report that Mr Mills died on the 29<sup>th</sup> day of January 1908, after an illness of about three days. Prior to his death, and at a preceding meeting of the City Council upon a receipt of a telegram from Judge Sims, representing this District in the Senate of Virginia, in reference to the Bill then pending before the General Assembly and having for its purpose the repeal of the law which prohibited the paralleling of the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac Rail Road, the Council passed a resolution authorizing the Public Interests Committee at its discretion to add to its number from the Citizens of its town and directed said Committee to go to Richmond Va and to use its utmost aid in the passage of the said bill. The Public Interest Committee did add to its number the following Gentlemen:

E M Young Jr S W Somerville W E Bradley
M B Rowe C W Jones E J Smith
A P Rowe A R Howard W D Carter
W W Butzner R H L Chichester C R Howard

The said entire Committee with additions did go to Richmond and individually and collectively did work for the passage of the said Bill, and the writer, who was in Richmond at the time and working for the success of the said measure begs leave here to report that every member of the said Committee did most cheerful and effective work in the aid of the passage of said bill, both by interviews with members of the General Assembly and by the interviews with members of prominence, whose efforts the Committee bespoke on behalf of the bill, and also by several members of the Committee making

public addresses before the Joint Committees of the Senate and House on Roads and Internal Navigation .

The whole of the said Committee was in Richmond on one visit and a portion of the Committee was there on two subsequent occasions, each time working in aid of the bill, and the undersigned begs leave to report that the bill passed the Senate of Virginia be the unprecedented vote of thirty-five to two, and later passed the House of Delegates by a like large vote of eighty-seven to eight, and has been approved by the Governor of Virginia, and is now written in the Laws of this Commonwealth. What the influence of this measure may be, the future alone can [Page 213] determine but the Committee thought that its influence would be largely beneficial to this City and Section and were correspondingly enthusiastic in advocacy of the measure.

The undersigned further reports that found in the vest pocket of Mr Mills after his death was a memorandum book stating the amount of expenditure made by him on behalf of his Richmond trips and Mr Mills requested members of the Committee to keep an account of their several expenditures individually made.

The amount expended by Mr Mills as shown by said book is (\$46.90) and the several individual expenditures have been reported by the members of the Committee to Col E D Cole, President of your body.

Mr Masters of Public Interests Committee presented the following bills which on motion of Mr Somerville were ordered paid:

Mr J W Masters of the Public Interests Committee had read a letter from the War Department at Washington addressed to A P Rowe, with an accompanying letter from Mr A P Rowe in regard to a detailed report of Tonnage etc, for the Rappahannock River for year 1907-1908.

On motion of Mr Bradley the matter was referred to the Public Interests Committee with power to act.

Mr Masters of Public Interests committee asked that some prompt action be taken as to the proposed Public Building.

Mr Fitzhugh, City Attorney, who was present, said he had been in communication with the legal department of the government, which had charge of the examination of titles of property acquired by the government and he thought it would be arranged in a short time and the money paid of the site.

Mr Warden of the Health Committee reported that his Committee had been under extraordinary expense and asked for an additional appropriation of two hundred dollars (\$200.00). Which on motion of Mr Young was allowed his committee by the following recorded vote: Ayes, Cole, Bradley, Lane, Rowe, Garner, Goldsmith, Dannehl, Masters, Warden, Somerville, Young.

Mr Somerville, of Joint Committee on School Building called up the report of the Joint Committee of Schools and Public Property viz; the new Public School Building, which was presented at last meeting and laid over to be taken up at next meeting. He reported that his Committee were unanimous on the Old Site, and for a building the estimated cost of which is \$30,000.00; that the Finance part of the report had been arranged, asking the Legislature for authority to issue (\$15,000.00) worth of 4% Bonds and that the other two recommendations were before the Council.

Mr J P Rowe moved the old school site be adopted according to the recommendations of the Joint Committee.

Mr A M Garner, presented and had the Clerk read a long petition with 206 names to it; asking that some other site be selected.

Mr Bradley asked the City Attorney how long it would take [Page 215] to get the right from the Legislature to put the School Building in the Park

Mr Fitzhugh did not think it possible unless there was an extra session of the Legislature, and then there was some opposition to the Park, and the bill might be held up.

Mr Young was very much opposed to locating the building on present site.

Mr Masters was opposed to present site and would vote for it only under protest.

A communication was presented from the School Board by Col Cole.

To Hon City Council of Fredericksburg Va

The undersigned members of Fredericksburg City School Board beg leave to call the attention of the council to the urgent necessity for a new school building for the accommodation of the white Public School of Fredericksburg for the next ensuing session of Schools.

This matter has been pending for a long time, and while we believe that the Council has been doing, and is now doing all in its power towards giving the Schools this building, yet we feel it our duty to lay

this matter again before the Council and to show our willingness to cooperate with the Council, so far as we can, by agreeing to discontinue the Schools at the Union House on May 1<sup>st</sup> 1908 in order to give the necessary time for the erection of said building, and we will undertake to provide for said schools during those two warm months, when fire will not be needed, provided we have the assurance that said building will be ready for occupancy by Oct first 1908.

In other words, we will do anything in reason to secure this much desired school building with as little delay as possible. It is not necessary for use to refer, except in passing to the dark, ill-ventilated and crowded school rooms in which we have enrolled 527 white children up to Feb'y 1<sup>st</sup> 1908 this session, and we recognize the growing necessity for larger quarters in which to accommodate the schools of next session, and therefore present for your consideration the pressing necessity for immediate action in the premises.

Superintendent B P Willis was heard and implored the Council not to delay action on Public School Building. Col Cole and Mr Dannehl also urged prompt action.

A vote was taken on Mr Rowe's motion to adopt the recommendation of the Joint Committee to use the present site, Main Street.

Mr Bradley presented a petition, signed by nearly every family in the neighborhood of the Hunter's Foundry pump asking that the pump near the building be kept open. He asked for a stay of action of the order of the City Council (of Dec 19, 1907) to close up same, and that the pump be taken charge of by the Water Committee and all necessary sanitary arrangements be made in its surroundings. Both amounts being, in the opinion of your Committee altogether inadequate, owing to the great danger of the disease spreading without proper care & quarantine measures, and the City having police jurisdiction a mile beyond the Corporation boundary. Your Committee felt justified in following this course.

The undersigned Joint Committee on Schools and Public Property to whom has been referred the matter of a Public School Building for this City, beg leave to make the following report.

First: That said Joint Committee made a report to the City Council on January 16<sup>th</sup> 1908 as follows: "That when Mr E G Heflin prepared plans and specifications for what he designated a (\$30,000) with (16 rooms) that the Committee report to the City Council the plans and specifications for said building and the plans and specifications for an (18 room) building estimated to cost (\$35,000) and that the Committee recommend to the Council to adopt the building estimated to cost \$30,000.

Second: This report was directed to lie over until the next meeting of the Council and the two sets of plans and specifications above referred to were furnished by Mr Heflin to the Joint Committee in the mean time.

Third: On Feb'y 20, 1908 the Joint Committee presented said plans and specifications to the Council and the Plans and specifications for the building estimated to cost (\$30,000) was referred back to the Joint Committee with instructions to make such modifications in the same as said Committee should deem proper and to advertise bids for furnishing material and constructing the said building.

The aggregate of these bids divided by seven show that their average is \$44,025. The bid of E G Heflin, the lowest bid is (\$\*,455) below the average of all the bids

Fifth: Your Joint Committee was unanimously of the opinion from the start that any Public School Building erected by the City should be of sufficient capacity to accommodate without crowding 700 pupils since the present number actually attending the Public School of the City is 529, and the erection of a new modern School Building would speedily increase the number and the maximum of 700 will certainly be reached in the next three or four years.

Sixth: The two contractors of this City, who bid on said plans and specifications E G Heflin and F P Stearns, both have stated to your Committee that it is not possible to furnish any plans and specifications for the erection of any adequate school building for the accommodation of 700 pupils for (\$30,000).

The seven bids actually received, five of them from experienced contractors out side of our City, and widely separated, testify to the same fact, and you Committee is reliably informed that all the bidders from a distance expressed the same opinion, that it was simply impracticable to build a school house to accommodate (700) pupils for (\$30,000) and the bidders from a distance expressed the opinion that it could not be built for (\$35,570)

Your Committee was informed by Mr Stamfer of the firm of Stamfer, Ragland and Co, one of the bidders and one of the leading, most reliable and largest contractors in Richmond Va, that his firm built the Barton Heights Public School Building and that it cost (\$28,000.) and was built to accommodate only 300 pupils. Mr Stamfer expressed the most emphatic opinion after carefully going over the plans and specifications that the building could not be erected for less than about (\$50,000). And that no plans and specifications could be drawn for a building to accommodate 700 pupils for anything like \$35,000.

Seventh: Hence your Committee concluded and so beg leave to report that it is impracticable for them to obey the [Page 229] Resolution of the Council of April the 16<sup>th</sup> that your Committee bring in estimate for a school building at a cost not exceeding (\$30,000).

Eighth: Your Joint Committee further reports that E G Heflin is willing to renew his bid of (\$35,570) provided the sum of (\$175) for additional cost of transportation of materials is added, or if the filter provided for in the plans and specifications is omitted, his big will be \$35,545. Your Committee deems the filter unnecessary.

And the part of the Second part hereby contracts to pay the party of the first part for said work in installments as provided for by resolution of the Council.

The President of the Finance Committee of The Council having reported to the Council. That the Board of Trustees of the State Normal School have reported to him at their meeting here on the 20<sup>th</sup> of May 1908.

That the said Board had incurred considerable expense and would incur additional expenses before the 28<sup>th</sup> of February 1909 when the fund of (\$25,000.00) the available for said Normal School, and be drawn from the State Treasury by said Board. The said Board has requested the City Council to loan the Board for their necessary expenses, the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) and has tendered the Council a draft of said Board, on said State Treasurer for said sum payable on 1<sup>st</sup> of March 1909. Resolved by the Council that the said draft be accepted and filed with the City Treasurer and the said Finance Committee check upon the fund of the City in the hands of the Treasurer in favor of Judge R H L Chichester, Treasurer of the said State Normal and Industrial School for said (\$600.00).

Col Cole brought to the attention of the Council that the Health Officer, Dr J N Barney, and the Health Committee had been furnishing supplies and practically supporting families since last January, in homes where small pox existed. Some of these families are in good financial circumstances. It developed that the Health Committee have overdrawn its account about (\$600.00) and that other bills have been contracted which have not been presented.

The opinion of the City Attorney, Mr Fitzhugh, was asked and he said: the Health Officer and the Health Committee had not right whatever to furnish such supplies or order the payment of same. That its power ended when quarantine was established except in cases of people who are unable to pay. When it was suggested that more bills would be presented in the Jacobs House case, Mr Warden said he did not know any bills for the Jacobs house had been paid; that the City was neither responsible for said bills, nor for the medical attention ordered by Health Officer Barney. The bills already paid for cases treated amount to over (\$1,000.00).

Mr Dannehl presented a report from Health Officer Barney giving a history of the Small Pox case since January.

Fredericksburg Va May 20, 1908

To the Council Committee on Health and Police

Gentlemen:

[Page 239]

I beg to present herewith a report showing the history and condition of the Small Pox cases present and past in our City.

On June 21, a case was reported to me by Dr Chewning Tompkins—a young man who had been exposed in rail-road work in a nearby County.

Under the instructions of your Committee, and the acting Mayor, I assumed change of said case; establishing quarantine, isolating, vaccinating those exposed and thoroughly sterilizing person and premises when care was completed. No Spread.

On Feb'y 14 a case was reported by Dr Doggett, diagnosis concurred in by Dr Hales Scott. This case who did not spread, and was quarantined as usual.

On Feb'y 28, another case was reported by Dr Doggett, we took usual charge and no further infection followed in this locality. These last two cases are supposed to have been contracted from an unsuspected case, due to infection from Stafford County about one month before.

On March 22, Dr Cassidy had a case which he turned over to the Health authorities, inflection probably contracted from a passerby who was watching him at work. No spread of disease.

Two days later I found a case near the Spoke Works, and some weeks later owing to a delayed vaccination another case developed in this house, the only instance where this recurred, and due doubtless to previous exposure before necessary vaccination.

The disease did not spread outside of the premises, this infection came from Stafford County through a visitor.

On April 13<sup>th</sup> by the direction of your Committee, I assumed charge of these cases in the county within a mile of our City Limits, and these terminated with no further spread.

April 6<sup>th</sup> case on Doswell field. No further trouble there.

On May 10<sup>th</sup>, three cases were reported by Dr Doggett and Cassidy and these were quarantined promptly and are still so. Due to Stafford County infection.

In the treatment of the above cases to date, the Health Officer has made 212 visits, sterilized nine houses, vaccinated 52 and send 2 cases out of town; they were not residents.

In no case has infection spread beyond the quarantined premises, and in practically every case the disease was brought here from nearly counties.

Based upon the figures furnished by Treasurer Knox, the City has guarded, fed, provided for the wants of 50 of its unfortunate citizens during a period of 196 days, [Page 240] at a cost of (\$547.46) this exclusive of medical attendance.

The average of the 8 cases was 6 per house, and the average number of days in quarantine was 24. It has cost the City thus about 70¢ per day, per individual in quarantine to provide food, fuel, guard and medicines.

Comparing our expenses here with those in other locations I beg to present the following facts: In Lancaster Co, Va 1904, 4 cases occurred in one house. Cost to that County \$2,000.00 as so stated to me by Dr Lewis, Health Officer of that County.

In Chesterfield County, five years ago, I am informed by Dr Fisher, Midlothian that they had a number of cases, mostly Negroes, cost County over (\$3,000).

Augusta Co, has just finished handling 4 cases in Craigsville. Cost according to *News Leader* "nearly (\$2,000.00).

The cost here has been, it seems to me, reasonable, and must be regarded as unavoidable, extraordinary and not likely fortunately soon to occur again.

The City which pretends to pay any attention to a dangerous and loathsome contagious disease can expect to have such cases more economically handled in the absence of an established Pest House, than is done by the direction of your Committee. That is no case has the disease, recognized as the most contagious in the medical list of eruptive diseases, spread beyond its original and imported source.

Mr Embrey of the Street Committee reported that his Committee had not been able to get an estimate of cost of curbing Prince Edward Street from Commerce to Fauquier sts owing to the absence of Surveyor Randall, but would have same ready for next meeting.

Mr Embrey reported progress on granolithic work on Lewis Street near Kenmore. [Page 241]

Mr Goldsmith of the Street Committee reported that after this granolithic work is completed on Lewis Street the street would be left in bad condition and it would [cost] less now to finish it up while the other work was being done and asked for an appropriation of (\$100.00) to grade the street.

On motion of Mr Bradley the sum of \$100.00 was appropriated to the Street Committee to grade and fix up Lewis Street along the line of the granolithic work from Winchester to Washington Avenue.

Mr Goldsmith presented the following communication

Fredericksburg, Va April 25, 1908

To the Mayor and members of the City Council

Gentlemen: Mayor T P Wallace having called my attention several times to the bad order of a certain cellar door, situated on Commerce Street adjoining the property occupied by A Wooding as a grocery store in reply will say. Some twelve or eighteen months ago, I was summoned by the Chairman of the Board, Mr E D Cole, also by Collector A P Rowe to appear before the City Attorney, Mr St Geo R Fitzhugh, to show cause why I had not paid the required tax on Street improvement, and when I stated the situation to these gentlemen, Mr Fitzhugh's reply was "Mr Cole, why in the devil don't you remedy this evil, the first thing you will have a suit on your hands. As yet this evil has not been

remedied and my property is being damaged each rainy spell, due to improper engineering, together with improper work.

I do not think Gentlemen that you can expect me to pay for, or renew such work, as has been done by the Corporation of Fredericksburg Va which has been admitted by the City Attorney as well as several members of the City Council, to be an utter and entire failure.

Gentlemen: if you are desirous of having the Collector's books closed in the near future, I ask that you give me suitable damage for my property, renewal of the cellar door, together with a credit of thirty four dollars (\$34.00) being the amount that I have been subjected to, due to the inferior manner in which this work has been done.

By complying with the above, I am willing at any time to make settlement of balance of account, otherwise it will necessitate my having to adopt Mr Fitzhugh's suggestion by bringing suit for damages.

At the Corporation line it is reduced to three fourths of an inch, which runs to the dividing line of the Smith property and the Fitzgerald tract. Mr Cole asked to be excused, as there was an important meeting of the Board of Directors of the State Normal and Industrial School, now in session, in our City considering the question of a site for the same.

On motion Col Cole was excused.

Mr Lane, Chairman of the Water Committee, through S J Quinn, Superintendent presented the following report

Messrs Lane, Cole & Masters, Committee on Water June 16, 1908

As Superintendent of the City Water Works, which includes the sewerage of the town I make my annual report covering both for the year ending June 15, 1908.

During the year we have constructed a sewer from the National [Blvd] down Spottswood Street connecting with the main sewer on Charlotte Street 625 feet. Not being permitted to construct a sewer on the Boulevard the owners of property front on the thoroughfare from Spottswood Street to the Spoke Works, requested that a main should be laid through the back part of their lots for the drainage of their buildings which was done, reaching the main sewer eon Wolfe Street, through a vacant lot belonging to the Spoke Works. Permission being given therefor this is 650 feet.

Another line was laid on Lewis Street, commencing at Mrs Bear's up Lewis Street to near Washington Avenue some 500 feet.

We also continued the sewer on Charlotte Street from the 50 foot line from Main Street up to Wheeler's undertaking establishment 200 feet.

The first two lines are 6" pipe; the one on Charlotte Street is 8" as that will be the sewer to connection with the Government building to be erected on the corner of Princess Anne and Hanover Streets.

We are now constructing a main line of pipe from the little canal on Hanover Street to the Corporation line, which will be a little over 1300 feet long when completed. Counting the laterals for these lines of pipe together with those that have been run to the buildings on the upper part of Main Street, during the year amount to 75, the total number of laterals is (466).

The seven years' exemption on all parties connecting with private sewers, expires this year; and will be charged up on the books for connection next May, which will add very materially to the income from the connection tax. The total amount of connection tax collected this year is (\$1,278.74) which has been paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the City and receipts given therefor.

The only serious trouble we have had with the sewer during the year was a break in the large pipe near where it empties into the River. The grade was so steep at that point we found it necessary to remove the Terra Cotta pipe and substitute iron pipe. This work was done by Mr J H Davis, and was a good job.

And I do not think we will have any more trouble at that point.

In addition to this the Committee purchased (250 feet) of hose for the purpose of flushing the sewers, which were indispensable.

The entire system of Sewerage is now, so far as I know, in good condition.

# City Water Works

The City Water Works, including machinery, etc are in good condition, as we have improved our facilities for pumping water on the hill, the draught on the reservoir has very largely increased also, necessitating the running of our large pump nearly one-fourth of the time during the months of May and June. It is quite probable that this great increase has been as much the waste, as the legitimate user of water, since the waste can be carried off by the sewers without inconvenience to any one. We have probably done more work outside of the regular expenses of the works this year than any one year since the construction of the works. At the close of last year we were laying a 6" main on Main Street, to the Germania Mills, and were brought to a halt near New Street, for lack of pipe. After the new year came in we proceeded to finish up that pipe at a cost of (\$491.22). Before the repairing of the National Boulevard, it was thought necessary that pipe should be laid across it, as the Government reported their unwillingness for it to be dug up for laying pipe. Therefore we laid a 4" pipe across the Boulevard at Willis Street; a 6" pipe at Weedon Street; a 4" across at Prince Edward Street, at a cost of (\$137.63).

We also connected the 6" main on Main Street running through the Woolen Mills yard, with a 4" main on Princess Anne Street, thereby materially strengthening the fire protection on that line of pipe at a cost of (\$76.25).

We also connected the 4" main on Main Street, by a 4" main upon Dixon Street, with the 4" main on Princess Anne Street at cost of (\$245.81). This was done in order to strengthen all the fire plugs on Main & Princess Anne streets below the Railroad and make them more efficient in case of fire. There are still two fire plugs on Main Street below Dixon that should be strengthened at some future time. We also repaired several hundred feet of stone wall in the little Canal below Frederick Street at a cost of (\$186.89).

In addition to this, the expenditures for street sprinkling to date amounting to (\$408.77) has been charged up to the running expenses of the Works. These outside expenditures amounted to (\$1,546.58) for which no appropriation was made except (\$300.00) which appropriation will be mentioned hereafter.

It will be seen that the collections this year fall below those of last year by (\$45.00). This is accounted for in the fact that last year several estimates were settled up which owed considerable amount for water rent. Besides many owing back dues were forced to pay up. This year we had but a small amount of back dues to collect.

The only improvement I would recommend at present is the one so often made regarding that part of town lying south of the little canal. Much of that section is almost without a domestic supply of water; and in no part of it is there anything like an adequate fire protection. I again call the attention of the Committee to this condition of things, with the hope that at some future time the matter may be remedied.

Contract of City with E G Heflin (School Building)

This contract made this 1<sup>st</sup> day of June 1908 by and between E G Heflin, party of the first part, and the City of Fredericksburg, Va, by its duly authorized agents, the Joint Committee on Schools and Public Property of the City Council.

Whereas the said E G Heflin prepared plans and specifications for a three story Public School Building for the City of Fredericksburg, to be erected on the lot in said City where the present Public School Building for White children stands, and

Whereas the said Heflin has made an offer to said City, through said Joint Committee that for thirty-five thousand five hundred and forty five dollars (\$35,545.00) he will furnish all the material and to erect said Public School Building in strict accordance with said plans and specifications, except that the filters called for in said plans and specifications are to be omitted and the well washed gravel is to

be substituted for crushed stone in the foundation work, and that the specifications, so far as the same related to the seasoned condition of the long leaf North Carolina Pine shall be modified so as to permit the use of the said Long Leaf North Caroline Pine as well seasoned as can be found in the market, and that the construction and erecting of the building shall be carried forward in such a way as to permit the seasoning of the floor joists before the floor is laid thereon, and before the ceiling lathes are attached there-to, not however, extending the time of completing the said building beyond the 15<sup>th</sup> of February 1909; and

Whereas the City Council of Fredericksburg on the 14<sup>th</sup> day of May 1908 accepted said proposition of said Heflin and on said day adopted the following resolution unanimously;

"Whereas, said proposition has been accepted by the Council, therefore resolved that the said Joint Committee for, and on behalf of the City of Fredericksburg execute with the said Heflin a contract for furnishing the material and building the School Building in accordance with the Plans and Specifications furnished by him to the Council, subject only to the modifications contained in his last proposition embodied in the report of the Joint Committee this night presented to this Council It is understood that the filter provided for in his original plans and specifications is omitted. The last proposition of said Heflin herein accepted is to furnish said material and erect said building for thirty five thousand and five hundred and forty five dollars (\$35,545) to be paid to him in such installments as the said Joint Committee shall approve.

Said Committee shall concurrently with the execution of said contract take from said Heflin bond called for by original specifications with security approved by the Joint Committee." [Page 263]

Now this contract: Witnesseth that the said E G Heflin, in consideration of the said sum of thirty five thousand and five hundred and forty five dollars (\$35,545.00) to be paid to him at such times and in such installments as the Joint Committee aforesaid shall approve, doth hereby contract with said City to do and to perform the work, and furnish all the materials and complete the Public School Building in strict accordance with the aforesaid plans and specifications and the design which accompanied said specifications, by the 15<sup>th</sup> day of February 1909, subject only to the modifications set forth in the foregoing preamble, viz; that the filters called for in said specifications are to be omitted, and that well washed gravel is to be substituted for crushed stone in the foundation work, and that the specifications so far as the same relate to the seasoned condition of long leaf North Carolina Pine shall be modified so as to permit the use of said Long Leaf North Carolina Pine as well seasoned as can be found in the market, and that the construction and erection of the building shall be carried forward in such a way as to permit the seasoning of the floor joists before the floors are laid thereon, and before the ceiling lathes are attached thereto, not however, extending the time for the completion of said building beyond the 15<sup>th</sup> day of February 1909, and subject to said modifications only the said plans and specifications are made a part of this contract as fully as if the same were recited herein and all of its requirements and stipulations and provisions are to be faithfully observed, obeyed and performed by the said Heflin as fully as if the same were herein specifically set forth, and all work done and material furnished under said specifications are to be subject to the approval of said Joint Committee or its duly authorized inspector.

And the City of Fredericksburg, Virginia by the aforesaid Joint Committee doth hereby contract to pay the said Heflin the said sum of thirty five thousand and five hundred and forty five dollars (\$35,545.00) as said work progressed and when the said building is completed in accordance with said plans and specifications at such time and in such installments as the said Joint Committee shall approve.

# Report of Auditing Committee

R T Knox, Treasurer

To the Honorable President and members of the Common Council of the City of Fredericksburg, Va Gentlemen: We, the undersigned, members of the Auditing Committee on the City of Fredericksburg beg leave to report that we have examined the accounts of Mr R T Knox, Treasurer of said City and found the same to be correct and supported by proper vouchers.

The said accounts of the Treasurer embrace the general accounts of receipts and disbursements which show a balance in the hands of the Treasurer to the credit of the City of Fredericksburg of eleven thousand, seven hundred and twenty nine 25/100 (\$11,729.25).

And we have examined the accounts for sewer connections which show a balance to the credit of the City of Fredericksburg at the Conway, Gordon & Garnett National Bank of fifteen hundred and ninetynine and 31/100 dollars (\$1,599.13).

The Treasurer's books also show that he has on hand seven \$100 Fredericksburg City bonds, four per

cent purchased May 3<sup>rd</sup> 1906 \$700.00 And three hundred dollar in Va Century 3% bonds \$300.00 Bonds on hand \$1,000.00

And his books show one hundred and sixty nine 25/100 dollars (\$169.25) to credit of City of Fredericksburg, Virginia this 22<sup>nd</sup> day of June 1908 at Conway, Gordon & Garnett National Bank to the credit of Sewer Funding account.

All the coupons from the various bonds due by the City have been paid up to this date and have been destroyed by burning, as shown by the Treasurer's vouchers given to Treasurer by the Finance Committee.

Treasurer Knox has in his hands (\$5,600.00) in Va Century Bonds belonging to General Sinking Fund account and there is to his credit at the Farmers and Merchants State Bank sinking fund account City of Fredericksburg (\$121.50) and there is [Page 274] to credit of the Public School Building fund (\$161.69) balance due City to-day in the Farmers and Merchants State Bank. The Treasurer has in his hands (\$5,800) of 3% Va Century Bonds.

We have examined the books of A P Rowe, Collector, S J Quinn, Superintendent of Water and Sewer, B F Bullock, Superintendent City Gas Works, and found the same correct and supported by proper vouchers.

Having reference to the balance on hand of last year of (\$1,555.08) it will be seen that notwithstanding the collections credited to this fund, the present balance exceeds last years balance by only \$44.15 (-2-)

Sewer Sinking Fund

The condition of the Sewer Sinking fund is satisfactory and in accordance with the orders of the Council

This bonded debt is \$18,000.00

The sinking fund to date is:

Fredericksburg 4% bonds of \$700.00 Va Century 3% bonds \$300.00 Cash in Treasurer's hands in Conway, Gordon and Garnett National Bank belonging to this fund (\$169.25)

The annual report of the Treasurer show this information [Page 275) in detail Old funded debt bonds outstanding.

Your Committee in last year's report showed that (\$600.00) of the old 7% bonds were still outstanding, and the money to redeem them had been deposited in the Planters National Bank of Richmond, bearing three percent interest.

This deposit now amounts to (\$617.97) plus interest on this amount from December 31, 1907. Your Committee recommends that this entire deposit be withdrawn after July 1, 1908 and carried to the City's General Fund, in as much as, it is bearing on 3% interest and the City can use the money for need expenditures and at any time the bonds turn up they can be paid from the General fund.

# General Sinking Fund

Your body has seen fit to treat and carry the Sewer bonds and the sinking fund for the reduction of the said bonds, separate and distinct from the other bonds of the City, and separate and distinct from the General Fund. Above is set forth the amount of the Sewer bonds and the condition of the Sinking Fund to meet and retire those bonds.

In addition there-to your Committee reports the general bonded indebtedness of the City to be (\$251,400.00) as shown by the report of Treasurer Knox's returned with this report, and the Sinking Fund to meet and retire this indebtedness as shown by Treasurer Knox's further report, consists of (\$5,600.00) of Virginia Century Bonds and (\$121.50) in cash all with the Farmers and Merchants State Bank, to order and credit of the City.

Your Committee further reports that in addition to the Sewer Bonds and general bonded indebtedness above set forth, there are outstanding and held by the National Bank of Fredericksburg three (\$5,000.00) script bonds, known as Gas & Water Bonds bearing 4% interest and payable respectively on the first day of November 1908, 1909 and 1910.

No Sinking Fund has ever been provided by the Council for the retirement of these bonds, but the same are to be paid out of the General Annual levies of the City, for the year as they fall due.

Recapitulating, your Committee here begs leave to report the entire bonded indebtedness of the City of Fredericksburg as follows.

That it shall not be lawful for the Treasurer to pay any amount in excess of appropriations aforesaid, and it shall be his duty to notify the Common Council at the next meeting thereafter if any of these appropriations are exhausted and not to pay any orders on bills until further appropriations are made to meet them.

Your Committee desires further to summarize a fact of the above report as follows:

The aggregate annual interest on the City's bonds indebtedness including interest on the \$15,000 due the National Bank is \$11,806.00

The annual aggregate appropriation for the sinking fund on the aggregate bonded indebtedness of the city is \$2,874.00

To this may be added the \$5,000 bond to be paid the National Bank on Nov 1, 1908 with interest on (\$15,000) \$5,600.00

Your Committee further reports that the estate of the late R W Adams Ex-City Treasurer is due the Corporation a balance of principal of about (\$2,302.45) the only asset from which to recover which sum is the interest of the said Adams in some Western land, and the Attorney for the City together with other attorneys in the case are at work endeavoring to realized the asset.

Your Committee, on last year, seeing the need of a new Public School Building recommended that an appropriation be made and a fund accumulated to anticipate the erection of a school building, since the erection of a new Public School Building has closed a contract for the erection of a new Public School Building and your Committee desire to report that in accordance with the statement of Treasurer Knox, filed herewith the school fund has now to its credit at the Farmers and Merchants State Bank (\$161.69) of money and Virginia Century Bonds of the par value of (\$5,800.00) in Treasurers hands.

For all of the above it will be seen that the balance on hand July 1, 1907 was (\$18,612.69) while the balance on hand July 1<sup>st</sup> 1908 amounts to only (\$11,729.25) a difference of about \$6,883.44, in favor of 1906 and 1907 as against 1907 and 1908, but your Committee desire to call attention to the fact that during the year just ended the several departments of the City have drawn on the Treasurer for extensions, permanent improvements and extraordinary demands in a sum approximating (\$11,800.00) expended by the following committees

Col E D Cole, then asked that his resignation as a member of the Council to take effect July 1, 1908 be received.

He expressed regret at the severance of the cordial relations which had existed between himself and the Council, thanked the members for the uniform courtesy extended to him while a member of the body and as Chairman of the Finance Committee, paid a high compliment to City Collector A P Rowe, and City Treasurer R T Knox, with whom he had come in close contact in his official work as most efficient officers and wished each and every officer of the City success.

The Police officers of the City of Fredericksburg Va have faithfully discharged their duties and are entitled to their pay.

On motion of Mr [blank] the Mayor's report was received and the salaries of the Police Officers ordered paid.

The President stated that a vacancy existed in the Council caused by the resignation of Col E D Cole. On motion of Mr Garner, it was determined to fill the vacancy.

Mr Lane placed in nomination Mr John C Melville and stated that Mr Melville having received a much larger vote at the recent election than any other of the newly elected Councilmen who will assume their duties September 1<sup>st</sup> 1908, he was entitled to election to the unexpired term. This nomination was seconded by Mr Young, and John C Melville was unanimously elected. Mr Melville was sent for, appeared before the Council and qualified before Clerk Eastburn by taking and subscribing the usual oath of office. Mr Melville received the hearty congratulations of the members of the Council.

With the concurrence of the Council the President made the following assignments of Committees, H B Lane, Chairman of Finance Mr J C Melville, Chairman of Water

Third on Finance and second on Alms House

Mr Lane of the Finance Committee reported that under instructions from the Council at previous meeting, the \$14,000 of Public School Bonds had been placed in the Farmers and Merchants State Bank to bear 3% interest subject to call in sums of (\$1000.00) and over.

That the \$600, with interest \$27.22 placed in the Planters Bank of Richmond to redeem at \$6.00 [Page 281] Bond of 7% Bonds recently funded and which is supposed to be lost or destroyed has been taken out of said bank and placed in the Treasury

That \$2,514.00 was placed to the credit of general sinking fund on July 1, 1908, instead of Jan'y 1, 1909 as has been previously done, thereby adding 6 months interest @ 3% to said fund until it can be used for securing bonds in January 1909.

He also reported placing \$205.50 accumulated interest from sinking fund in bank at 3% interest.

Mr Lane also reported additional amount to credit of general Sinking Fund \$5,600 of Virginia Century Bonds and to credit of Sewer Sinking Fund (\$201.75)

He stated that there were \$700 of 4% City Bonds belonging to the Sewer Sinking Fund, and asked for authority to trade these bonds for Sewer Bonds, and burn up said Sewer Bonds.

On motion of Mr Young, the Finance Committee was granted authority to make such exchange and the report of the Committee was received and ordered filed.

Mr Goldsmith of Streets reported the condition of the macadam from Winchester to Washington Avenue on Lewis Street, a distance of 490 feet at a cost of less than (\$150.00) that the work was highly satisfactory.

He also stated that similar work could be done for about (\$200.) for each block. This work consists of a road bed of 4 inches of crushed stone and one inch of fine stone, well rolled with the heavy roller of Henry Warden, who kindly loaned the same free of cost for which the returned thanks.

Mr Lane of the Water Committee reported that he had complaints from citizens on Winchester Street from Colbert's Corner to Frank K Tyler's as to insufficient water piping. The Committee were instructed to investigate and report back to the Council.

Mr Garner asked what had been done with the (\$25.00) appropriated to the Water Committee last September with instructions to clean out and fix up around Gunnery Spring.

Mr Lane replied that the matter had been overlooked.

On motion of Mr Garner, the sum of (\$25.00) was appropriated to the Water Committee with instructions to use the same in cleaning out and fixing up Gunnery Spring and around the same. [Page 282]

Mr Rowe of the School Committee reported that the contract for the maintaining of ten scholarships in the Fredericksburg College had expired and recommended a renewal of said contract.

On motion of Mr Rowe, the following resolution was adopted by unanimous recorded vote. Ayes, Bradley, Lane, Rowe, Goldsmith, Garner, Dannehl, Masters, Warden, Young (9 votes) Resolved that the contract heretofore made between the Fredericksburg College and City of ten scholars at (\$450.00) be renewed with this condition. That the School Board to whom the matter is referred shall furnish the ten (10) scholars from the Public Schools of this City.

If less than ten scholars (10) are furnished there shall be a pro rata, reduction of the above sum of (\$450.00).

If the above ten (10) scholars cannot be obtained from the Senior Class of the Public School, the School Board exercise their judgment in selection of others, all from citizens of Fredericksburg, Va.

Mr Lane of the History Committee reported that his Committee was in a position to make a highly satisfactory report; that it had received orders for (319) copies at \$1.50 each; that (1,000) copies will cost the City not over (\$675.00); That he felt assured if the Committee was instructed to have the History published, not a dollar would be taken out of the City Treasury; That the Publisher had agreed to furnish the History splendidly bound on such terms that before it became necessary to make the final payment sufficient money would be realized from the book to meet all costs.

Mr Dannehl in the Chair

Mr Bradley sustained Mr Lane, and on motion of Mr Young the following resolution was adopted unanimously.

Resolved: That the History Committee of the Council be empowered to have published (1,000) copies of the History of Fredericksburg Va, purchased of and written by Captain S J Quinn at a cost not to exceed (\$675.00)

During the year ending August 31<sup>st</sup> 1908 there has been 704 arrests as against 1135 during the year ending August 31<sup>st</sup> 1905, the first year of my administration as Mayor. There has been a very great decline in the number of crimes and criminals in each year of my administration and necessarily this carries with it a decline in the amount of fines received and in the work of the Chain Gang upon the Streets.

This year the work has amounted to

Gentlemen: In entering upon this discharge of my duties as the Chief Executive Officer of the City of Fredericksburg, I deem it meet and proper that I should call to the attention of your body some matters appertaining to the welfare of our City, and at the same time I would express to you the hope that during my administration, the executive and Legislative branches of our City Government may work together in certain co-operation for the advancement of our City citizen's interests [Page 293] it does not seem out of place to mention the fact that we enter upon our duties with the responsibility of providing for extraordinary obligations undertaken by our predecessors for the cost of erecting a new City Free School Building and the appropriation for the establishment here of a State Normal School amounting in the aggregate to (\$55,000.00).

Hence it is needless to suggest that economy should be the keynote of your body meaning thereby that there should be incurred as little extraordinary expense as is consistent with the progress and prosperity of our City, and as far as practicable expenditures should be held down to appropriations.

The idea of any increase in taxation is not to be entertained for the necessity there for does not exist. By proper economy the obligations mentioned can be discharged in two years from the surplus revenue of our City without interfering with appropriations for current expenses.

From the last report of your Finance Committee it will be seen that the estimated revenues for the current year from all sources together with the balance in the Treasury on July 1<sup>st</sup> 1908, will amount to (\$79,503.91). Deduct the amount of estimated current expenses for the year amounting to (\$54,515.00)

and this years' (\$5,000.00) appropriation for the Free School Building and we have left over a balance of (\$19,988.91). So there will be at the end of the current year approximately an unappropriated balance over and above estimated current expenditures of (\$20,000.00).

One half of this amount of surplus revenue can be applied to payment of cost of the Free School Building, and the other half be applied to the Normal School appropriation.

This (\$10,000.00) applied to cost of the Free School Building together with the present fund in the hands of the City Treasurer from the proceeds of the sale of the (\$15,000.00) of City Bonds, and the appropriation of (\$5,000.00) last year and that amount this year for the Free School Building, would make the aggregate of (\$35,000.00), the contract cost in round numbers of the City's Free School Building.

An appropriation of (\$10,000.00) this year and that amount next year, would liquidate the Normal School obligations. The (\$10,000.00) to be appropriated next year can be legally raised on January 1<sup>st</sup> next by means of revenue notes to mature when taxes are collected in the Fall.

These suggestions are offered in the hope and belief that they point the way to avoiding the necessity for any increase in our present rate of taxation.

The importance of practicing strict economy so as to speedily pay off the extraordinary obligations before referred to, becomes the more apparent when we consider the pressing need of Street and Sidewalk improvements.

[Page 294]

Indeed there are some sections of our City in which the side-walks in bad weather are so wretched that it would not be money ill-spent if some of our Street appropriations could be spared for improving same.

It is oftentimes a preventive of extravagance to look back over items of expenditures. Therefor as a means of encouraging economy, if might be well for each Committee of the Council to file an itemized statement of its previous expenditures when asking for further appropriations.

One other matter: Paragraph 1, under Chapter XLII of our City Ordinances, making it the duty of the Mayor to appoint the Council's standing Committees is obsolete and a nullity under our present Virginia Constitution, and the Mayor has no such authority now. When this ordinance was passed the Mayor was part of the Council, being the Presiding officer, but the new constitution has entirely separated the Mayor from the Council. The Mayor now representing the Executive and the Council the Legislative branches of our City Government. The only power affecting the actions of the Council now preserved by the Mayor are the veto power and the power to decide all questions "in case of a tie" and the power of convening the in serving Council following an election, and these powers exist by virtue of the Constitution and City Charters.

The rule of law is general that "The Common Council appoints its Committees whenever necessary to the proper performance of municipal functions (See Pollard code of Va, Section 1115G and 2<sup>nd</sup> Ed of English and American Encyclopedia Law Vol 20, page 1216 and authorities cited) It is also an established principal of law "that the public power or trusts developed by law or charter upon the Council or governing body of a municipal corporation to be exercised by it, when and in such manner as it shall judge best, cannot be delegated to others." The Council can delegate a power administrative or ministerial powers, but it cannot delegate a power where discretion or judgment is to be exercised, such as selecting Committees, the appointments of which involve judgment and discretion and may materially affect legislations (See 90 Va Page 77; 1 Dill Mun Corp (3<sup>rd</sup>) Sec 96:2 ed, English and American Encyclopedia Law Vol 1, pages 975 and 976, and Vol 23, page 365; and Vol 20, page 1217) Hence since the adoption of the new Constitution of Virginia any ordinance delegating to the Mayor the power of appointed the standing Committees of the Council is null and void and of no validity, for being a power requiring the exercise of judgment and discretion, it cannot be delegated to others. Therefor in view of my official oath, I must leave with [Page 295] with your body the appointment of your standing Committees.

Peculiarly well situated as regards industrial and commercial advantages with the finest water power and the best of sites for all kinds of manufacturing plants; in the midst of a rich and prosperous section producing large and various crops; having a prosperous and progressive population; possessing excellent railroad and water transportation facilities; and the prospect of another competing railroad in the near future; with unusual advantages as to health, residence, schools, and churches, there is no reason why Fredericksburg should not at once enter on an era of great development. All that is needed by its people is organization and co-operation. And, Gentlemen of the Council I assure you of my cheerful readiness to act with you in any matter looking to the advancement of our city. Very respectfully, H Lewis Wallace, Mayor of the City of Fredericksburg, Va

Mr F L W Green nominated Samuel Fitzhugh for Clerk of the City Market, and Mr Fitzhugh was unanimously elected Clerk of the City Market at a salary of \$75.00 per year.

On motion of Mr Masters the salary of Superintendent of the City Alms House was fixed at (\$150.00) per year, application of J W Ball was read by the Clerk and J W Ball was unanimously elected Superintendent of the City Alms House at a salary of \$150.00 per year.

On motion J B Herndon was elected scavenger for the upper ward.

On motion R L Carneal was elected scavenger for the Lower Ward.

On motion of W S Embry Jr C A Gore was unanimously elected Special Police officers in the same conditions as last year at a salary of (\$25.00) per month.

Mr Bradley of the Public Property Committee reported that the "Wallace Library" Building was nearing completion and his Committee thought it ought to be insured and offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted.

"Resolved that the Public Property Committee be instructed to make application and sign the necessary paper to obtain insurance for (\$3,500.00) three thousand five hundred dollars on the "Wallace Library" building in Fredericksburg Va in the Mutual Assurance Society of Virginia.

#### W E Bradley, President in the Chair

Mr Rowe, Chairman of the Water Committee reported that the work of laying 3" cast iron water pipe on Winchester and Hawk Streets was nearly completed, and that more time was desired by his Committee in reference to the raceway below the Rail Road, as there were [Page 299] more questions that his committee wished the opinion of the City Attorney and that he was out of the City taking a much needed rest.

Mr Masters called the attention of the Council to the fact that an implied if not expressed premise had been made to the property owners on Lower Main Street that when the City took away their shade trees to put down the street improvement that spaces for trees would be left in the granolithic sidewalk, and said trees replaced by the City. The three parties had secured permission for the Street Committee and planted Norway Maple Trees. That it was desirable that all the trees be of the same variety and set out at the same time, and offered the following resolution which was adopted by the following recorded vote.

Resolved that the Street Committee be instructed to purchase and set out Norway Maple shade trees 10 or 12 feet high, in all the spaces left in the granolithic side walk along the street improvement, for trees on lower Main Street.

W S Embrey Jr of the Street Committee called the attention of the Council to the present condition of the National Boulevard and thought that some body should have charge of it and clean it up and keep it in proper condition, and offered the following resolution which was lost by the following vote:

Nos, Lane, Melville, Rowe, Goldsmith, Garner, Masters, Green, Bradley (8 votes) Yeas, Embrey Jr and Howard (2 votes)

As it was thought unwise to take any action at this time on account of certain correspondence going between the Public Interest Committee and the United States Government.

Resolved that, the Public Interest Committee communicate with the proper U S Government authorities through our Representative Hon W A Jones in regard to taking care of and cleaning of the National Boulevard.

Mr Rowe of the School Committee in absence of Mr Warden, Chairman of the Joint Committee on New School Building reported that the work in the New School Building was progressing nicely and that the corner stone was laid with Masonic Honors on Tuesday Sept 15, 1908. [Page 300]

Mr Lane moved that the report be received and that the account of the ceremonies attending the laying of the corner store, contained in the *Daily Star* of Sep 16, 1908 [Page 3, column 3] be spread upon the Council records as a part of the Joint Committee report. Unanimously adopted.

**Corner Stone Ceremonies** 

The laying of the cornerstone of the Public School Building in this City Tuesday makes another notch in the progress of educational advantages for our people. The building is situated on the corner of Lewis and Main streets and with the play ground attached will occupy more than half of an entire block. Its frontage is 105 ft 9 in; depth 77.6; height three stories and will cost when completed and furnished (\$40,000.00). It will be up-to-date in every particular. The plans were drawn by E G Heflin, who is contractor also.

The whole work was started by and is being done under the direction of a joint Committee of the City Council composed of the Committee on Schools and Public Property, with Frank P Stearns, inspector. Ground was broken for the building on June 8<sup>th</sup> 1908 and the contract calls for its completion on Feb'y 15<sup>th</sup> 1909.

The ceremonies attendant upon the laying of the corner stone were simple but impressive. The progression was formed at the Court House square Tuesday Sep 15, 1908 at 3:45 PM and the march was down Princess Anne to Hanover to Main and up Main to the Building.

Lieutenant A G Billingsley of Co L 3<sup>rd</sup> Reg Va was chief marshal with the following aides, members of the same Company; Sergeants Geo E Rowland & Allen Berry; Corporals C E Cox and C L Hart and J W Humphries.

There was only one carriage in the procession. In this were Mayor H Lewis Wallace, Judge J T Goolrick, of the Corporation Court, Rev Dr T S Dunaway, and Supt of Schools B P Willis.

The City Council, the City School Board, and School officers were next on foot. With the City Council were ex-President Col E D Cole, Ex Vice President Henry Dannehl and Ex-Chairman S W Somerville, of the Joint Committee which started the movement for the Building.

Then came five hundred and fifty school children with their teachers. This was the prettiest sight of all. These children were dressed in while with garlands of flowers on their heads, carrying United States flags.

The Junior Order of American Mechanics, The Patriotic song of American had representatives who followed the school children. Then came Lodge No 4 A M & A M with past Grand Master S J Quinn and Worshipful Master Clarence R Howard, Senior Warden J P Stiff [Page 301] and Junior Warden E M Young Jr. On arrival the children formed around the building. The presiding officers and officials took stand on the temporary platforms erected.

Mayor H Lewis Wallace called the assemblage to order and said:

Ladies and Gentlemen and fellow citizens of Fredericksburg: Having the Honor and pleasure of presiding over this assemblage. I respectfully call it to order. We assemble here for the purpose of laying the cornerstone of our new Public School Building, which by invitation will be done by the

Masonic Lodge. The order of the ceremonial will be in accordance with the program published yesterday evening in our local newspapers.

This is an occasion in which we all should take pride, for it marks a great advancement in the progress of our City, showing that we are in line with the general educational advancement of our state and country. That all good citizens heartily approve the object sought to be attained by the erection of this handsome and commodious School Building goes without saying.

This building will be a credit and an ornament to our city; it supplies a great public demand; it prevents the over crowding of scholars, heretofore unavoidable because of our limited School House accommodations; it puts an end to the unsanitary arrangement of renting rooms here and there to accommodate the overflow pupils; it obviates the necessity of turning away any child seeking the advantages of a public school education; it will be a monument to the wisdom and foresight of the Joint Committee that has the work in charge, and I congratulate the entire community on the successful outcome of the undertaking.

The song "America" was sung by the School Children. Rev Dr T S Dunaway the oldest minister, not only in point of service, but of age and residence here, delivered a short, impressive prayer: Superintendent of Schools, B P Willis, made an interesting address. He spoke of the difficulties under which the School Board had labored, of the needs of the new School Building, the progress made by Fredericksburg from a financial, educational and moral standpoint; referred to the new Post Office Building, Wallace Library Building, Normal School, College and other indications of advancement. He complimented the Joint Committee and its Ex-Chairman S W Somerville on its work.

The exercises were then turned over the Lodge No 4 A F and A M who laid the corner stone with Masonic Honors. Past Grand Master S J Quinn conducting the ceremonies. [Page 302]

This was watched by hundreds of people, from the windows of the present school building, and other points of vantage. The closing song was sung by the entire public school and the benediction was pronounced by Rev Dr T S Dunaway.

(42) On every keeper of a livery or feed stable (\$50.00) and on all vehicles for hire, not owned by a livery or feed stable keeper, shall be paid the specific tax of (\$4.00) on each one-horse vehicle, and (\$8.00) on each two-horse vehicle; provided that every year during the time of the Rappahannock Valley Agricultural and Mechanical Society's Fair, and person desiring to run a vehicle to haul passengers to and from the Fair, may do so without any license charged therefor; on every milk wagon from which milk is sold or delivered in this City there shall be a license tax of (\$5.00)

This ordinance4 shall take effect from its passage.

Approved and recommended for adoption

Gentlemen: It is with pleasure that I certify that the Police Officers respectively have faithfully and diligently discharge their duties for the past month.

Retired officer Gore having departed this life since the last regular meeting of the Council, leaving surviving him a widow and three infant children dependent on the salary given him by the City for their living. I would respectfully recommend that the salary be continued for the benefit of the family and paid his widow for such reasonable time as meets with the approval of the Council.

I beg to report fines amounting to (\$116.50) collected and turned over by me to the City Treasurer since Sept 1<sup>st</sup> 19081

Being very desirous of having our streets, certainly Main and Commerce, kept as cleanly as possible and believing the Council desirous of aiding all it can in the attainment of this end, I hope I will be pardoned for expressing the hope that the Council may approve and adopt the recommendations which I understand will be submitted by the Street Committee that refuse receptacles be placed at proper intervals along Main and Commerce streets so as to afford a means of keeping rubbish and trash from being thrown in the said Streets, and form and pass an ordinance requiring that rubbish and trash be not thrown on said Streets but into receptacles.

There being so many complaints made to me about the over-loading and over-working of horses within our City, that I feel it my duty to respectfully suggest to the Council that it take up the matter and after due consideration to the convenience of the Public as well as to the suffering horses thus ill-treated frame and pass such ordinance as required by the circumstances, specifying a given load for a horse of a given size and condition.

Gentlemen: It gives me pleasure to certify that each of the Police Officers of our City has faithfully discharged his duty for the past month.

The amount of fines collected by me for the past month and turned over to the City Treasurer is \$32.00. In this connection it gives me pleasure to state that during the past thirty days exceptionally good order has prevailed throughout our City. There having been need of but few arrests as attested by the small amount of fines collected.

I trust I will be pardoned for again referring to the urgent importance of providing Main and Commerce Streets with refuse receptacles which would render it so much easier to keep these Streets clean. Most of the trash and paper littering our Streets is thrown there by purchasers from our stores who would gladly deposit the same in a receptacle for the purpose if such is provided.

Considering the difficulty of getting the necessary force of water for copy with and extinguished fire out along the Boulevard, which was experienced during the recent conflagration, that resulted in the loss we hope temporarily, of not only one of our most important industries, but the throwing out of work right upon the threshold of winter, many deserving artisan.

I would suggest that steps be taken to remedy the trouble.

True, our City debt and expenses are such as not to warrant any great expenditure of money in any direction just at this juncture, but the flow of water would be rendered more forceful were smaller plugs and smaller hose provided for use where the Main pipe is not sufficiently large to force a strong flow of water through our present large hose.

Mr Melville of Light, submitted report of Supt Bullock of Gas Works as the report of the Committee: Nov 19, 1908

Mr J C Melville, Chairman Light Committee

Dear Sir: Continuous complaints having been made to me of the lack of pressure of the gas on upper Commerce Street and along Prince Edward, Lewis, Hawke, Fauquier, Winchester, and Washington Ave, from about 5 o'clock until 10 and having investigated the matter carefully find these complaints are justifiable.

The trouble is caused by the supply pipes not being large enough and when the heavy draw of gas is one, on Main and Commerce Streets, not enough pressure is left to supply these places through the small pipe.

The entire section named leaving out upper Commerce Street is supplied with a 3" main connected into Commerce Street-Prince Edward.

The 6" main on Commerce Street ends at the corner of Prince Edward and Commerce Streets, sometimes called "Hirsh's" corner, and from there up for about 100 ft there is a 3" pipe and the rest of the way up Commerce Street is supplied by an 1¼" pipe.

The condition at Mr Frank Stearns' house is very bad, he having to discard his gas range altogether and is not able to burn more than one light with satisfaction, on lighting a second light the first reduced so that it does not give light enough.

The only way to relieve this trouble is by extending the Mains, running the 6" pipe up Commerce to Barton Street, the corner Capt Quinn lives one, and thence a 4" pipe from there to Washington Avenue, then along said Avenue, connecting with a 4" pipe already on Lewis Street and ending by a connection with a 3" pipe now on Washington Avenue.

The running of this pipe is in line with an improvement mapped out three years ago, and when the pipe run out the Boulevard last Spring is connected with the end of the Main on Commerce Street there improvements will be complete. This will then give a circuit starting from the Gas Works each way, and being connected, will give a uniform pressure all over town.

I know your have to be careful of money this year, but as this is a revenue producing plant, and doing this work may increase the revenue and if not done with certainly decrease the revenue, I most earnestly ask that you recommend to the City Council that they give us the necessary money to do this work.

To Messrs Rowe, Lane and Garner, Committee on Water

Gentlemen: At your request, although not an expert in such matters, I herewith present an estimate for clearing out the covered canal from south corner of Kenmore Shoe Factory to the point reached by the Fredericksburg Milling Co in cleaning some years ago.

The work of a few years ago terminated in front of the store door of Major W S Embrey, deceased. The distance to be cleaned is 150 feet. The Canal has an average width of five feet and the filling averages four feet. This filling consists of a mixture of stiff mud and sand is quite heavy and difficult to handle because of its adherence to both shovel and barrow.

Again, in order to remove and take care of this filling, a part of it will have to be handled four, and a part of it five times. Besides these men in the culvert will have to work in a bending or stooping position. These things make the work both slow and expensive. Considering these conditions and estimating as closely as we can, not providing for any cave in or other accident, but alone for relieving the mud, the cost is \$255.00.

In consequence of the Canal being filled with mud it is not possible to examine the banks thoroughly to see what condition they are in. We know, however, that they have only one inch boards lining the banks and most of these boards are bent into serpentine shapes showing that they are pressed in by the caving walls or by some other pressure behind them. In one or two places they are leaning from the banks or else the width of the Canal has contracted.

Nearly all the braces are gone and those remaining are in bad condition.

The covering of the Canal is a double layer of cedar posts, some eight feet long, running well into the banks on either side. The sap of these timbers has rotted, leaving in some places small cracks through which fine earth may sift, but not to any great extent and it is thought these posts will stand for many years to come.

In this estimate no repairs for these timbers is included, because the covering could not well be renewed without removing the dirt from the top to do which we would have to cross the National Boulevard diagonally, which the government might object to.

The estimate therefore here presented includes casing the banks of the canal with two inch white oak boards, securely nailed to posts into the banks at intervals of four feet, bracing each of them both aat top and bottom.

The estimate for this work is (\$220.00)

And the said Finance Committee have agreed subject to the ratification of the Council with the holders of said Bonds of the above number that the payment of said (\$22,000.00) of said 5% bonds shall be extended for 20 years, and that the limitation in the said Deed of Trust, if any exist in favor of the City, securing the same, shall be extended as provided by Section 2935 of the Code of Virginia at any time before the expiration of the said Twenty years, the said bonds so extended are to bear interest at the [Page 320] rate of 4% payable semi-annually on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of January and July of each year to be evidenced by a sheet of coupons payable semi annually to be signed by the Treasurer of the city and attached to such bond;

And the City of Fredericksburg is to have the right-to pay off and extinguish the whole or any part of said twenty two bonds so extended after ten years from the the 1<sup>st</sup> day of January 1909.

Now therefore be it ordained that the agreement set out in the preamble of this ordinance be adopted, ratified and confirmed and that the Mayor of this City do extend said bonds by causing the same to be stamped with the words "This bond extended for twenty years at 4%, with the right of the City to redeem the same after the 1<sup>st</sup> day of January nineteen hundred and nineteen" which said extension the Mayor shall sign and affix the seal of the City thereto;

And it is further ordained that the Finance Committee shall have full power to carry out on behalf of the City the details of this Ordinance and the provisions set out in the preamble thereto, and (\$25.00) or so much of same as needed is appropriated, subject to the order of the Finance Committee for the necessary expenditure in providing sheets of coupons, and a rubber stamp, and for other necessary expenses; and the Treasurer of the City is direct to sell the \$5,600.00 of Va Century Bonds held for the Sinking fund appropriate the proceeds of the same together with any other money in the Sinking Fund and if necessary supplementing the same with any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated to the payment of the remaining (\$8,000.00) of said 5% bonds mentioned in the preamble of this ordinance maturing January 1<sup>st</sup> 1909.

And the Clerk of the Corporation Court is hereby appointed Attorney in fact to extend the limitation of said Deed of Trust pursuant to section 2935 of the Code of Virginia at any time before the expiration of twenty years from the 1<sup>st</sup> day of January 1909. The present limitation not expiring before the end of said twenty years, at the request of any holder of said extended bonds.

This ordinance shall be in force from its passage."

On motion of Mr Howard the rules were suspended by the following vote: Ayes, Lane, Melville, Rowe, Garner, Embrey, Brown, Masters, Warden, Howard, Bradley (11 votes)

On motion of Mr Rowe seconded by Mr Embrey the above ordinance was adopted by the following recorded vote:

Mr Embrey of the Street Committee reported in resolution referred to his Committee Sep 17, 1908 in regard to planting trees in spaces left in improved pavement on Lower Main Street.

That the trees had been secured and planted and presented the following bill of S E Covey

Approved Embrey, Howard, and Goldsmith (Committee) \$76.50

On motion of Mr Garner ordered paid and report ordered filed.

Mr Melville of the Light Committee reported that the sum of (\$1,200.00) appropriated by the Council June 18, 1908 to pay the balance of the new wheels for the Electric Light Plant had not been used prior to July the 1<sup>st</sup> 1908 and after that date reverted back to the general fund of the City. And that since the appropriation for this year was made to the Electric Light Plant, the bill came in and had been paid by the Light Committee out of their annual appropriation and asked that (\$1,200.00) be appropriated to the Electric Light Committee to reimburse them for that amount spent out of their general appropriation for the balance due on the new wheels for the Electric Light Plant.

On motion (\$1,200.00) was appropriated to the Electric Light Committee to reimburse them for the \$1,200.00 spent out of this annual appropriation by the following recorded vote.

Mr Rowe of the Water Committee reported on Canal near Kenmore that in advice of the City Attorney, the owner of the canal had been notified of its condition and requested to fix same.

Mr Rowe moved to go into the Election of Supt of City Water Works and the motion was unanimously adopted

On motion of Mr Rowe the Salary of Supt of Water was fixed the same as last year \$900.00 per annum by unanimous recorded vote.

Ayes, Lane, Melville, Rowe, Garner, Embrey, Brown, Masters, Warden, Howard, Bradley

Application of S J Quinn was read by the clerk and S J Quinn as elected by unanimous vote, Superintendent of the City Water Works for the next 12 months at the same salary as last years, \$900.00 per annum.

Mr Melville of the Light Committee moved to go into the Election of Superintendent of the Gas Works, adopted.

Mr Goldsmith moved that the salary of the Superintendent of the Gas Works be the same as last year. One thousand dollars and rent of house on Gas Plant and fuel and lights: adopted by unanimous recorded vote.

Ayes, Lane, Melville, Rowe, Garner, Embrey, Brown, Masters, Warden, Howard, Bradley (11 votes)

Application of B F Bullock was read by the Clerk and B F Bullock was elected superintendent of the Gas Work for next year at the same salary as last year. One thousand dollars, rent of house on Gas plant and fuel and lights by the unanimous vote of the Council.

Mr Howard of the Ordinance Committee presented an Ordinance

To prohibit the throwing of sample packages of medicine or other merchandise or of hand bills, circulars, or other advertising matter in yards, halls, porches, driveways or vestibules. Laid over 30 days

Mr Howard of the Public Interests Committee reported that he attended the Rivers & Harbors Congress in Washington D C December 9 & 10, as a delegate from the Council. The attendance was large, and some of our national big men spoke.

Mr Masters of the Health Committee reported on bill of Health Officer Barney referred to his Committee at the last meeting of the Council for information. That the bill was correct and his Committee recommended that it be paid.

In view of the possible difficulties in securing a physician to take charge of contagious diseases such as we experienced last year when we had so many cases of Small Pox, your Committee recommends that

the salary of the Health Officer be increased [Page 323] from \$75.00 to (\$300.00) per year as conditions that the duty of attending all such cases shall devolve on him.

Mr Bradley outlined a plan as talked over with the Health Officer whereby the duties of attending the City's poor would be included in the duties referred to above.

On motion of Mr Lane referred to the Health Committee to make arrangements with the Health Officer including the addendum and prepare and present to this Council an Ordinance covering the same. Adopted if contract is made to date from January 1, 1909.

Mr Warden Chairman of the Joint Committee reported that the work on the New Public School building was progressing nicely. That he had a request from Mr Hefllin, contractor, for another allowance in his contract price for erecting new Public School Building; Mr Stearns, inspector was present and recommended that the sum of (\$6,000.00) be paid Mr Heflin in his contract.

Mr Bradley moved and it was adopted

That the Recommendation of Inspector Stearns be approved by the Joint Committee And that we, (The Joint Committee now in session) recommend that the City Council pay to Mr E G Heflin, contractor the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) on his contract price for erecting the new Public School Building.

The Joint Committee on Schools and Public Property having reported to the Council that Inspector F P Stearns has reported to said Joint Committee that the Contractor Mr E G Heflin is entitled to receive additional sum of (\$6,000.00) on account of material and work done on the City Public School Building, which estimate of the inspector is approved by the Joint Committee. Resolved by the Council

That the Finance Committee of the Council and the City Treasurer united in drawing a draft on the Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Fredericksburg Va in favor of E G Heflin for (\$6,000.00) to be paid out of the fund loaned said Bank by the City.

Mr Lane of the History Committee reported the History of Fredericksburg Va written by Capt S J Quinn and ordered published by the City Council is in the hands of the History Committee and is a work of which all parties connected with it should feel proud, and offered the following which was adopted.

Resolved that the Committee on History and Council is hereby authorized to collect one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) form each subscriber to the History of Fredericksburg Va and eleven cents (\$0.11) addition on those whose books are to be sent by mail, and turn the same over to the City Treasurer who is hereby charged to keep this fund separate from other funds in his hands.

Resolved that said Committee is also authorized to draw upon said fund for the expenses incurred by it or may be incurred in the publication of said History and the distribution of the books, and also for the bill for printing the same, when it shall become due, and make full report to this body of its receipts and expenditures in the discharge of these duties.

Mr Warden moved and it was adopted that the Public Property Committee procure, frame and hand in the Council Chamber a map of the City.

Mr Goldsmith asked for information in regard to the City's rights on Winchester Street and Washington Avenue extended. Col Cole was present and was heard on the subject. A legal question, no action taken.
